SPORTS Women taken by Tigers in semis

COLLEGEPARK, Md. - The UNC women's tennis team built an early lead only to be defeated by the Clemson Tigers 5-4 in the semifinals of the ACC women's tennis championship Saturday afternoon.

Clemson rallied from a 4-2 deficit after singles to sweep all three doubles matches in a repeat of the two teams' rogular season matchup two weeks ago. In the No. 1 spot, UNC's Cinda Surney defeated nemesis Mimi Burgos in three sets. After dropping the bist set 3-6, Gurney battled back to take the second and third sets, 6-2, 6-1. At the No. 3 spot, Alisha Portnoy of North Carolina defeated Amy Young to avenge her regular season loss, 3-6, 6-2, 6-3.

At the No. 4 and No. 5 singles spots, UNC's Valerie Farmer and Dana Kanell

repeated their strong performances of Tar Heels' last 31 games. Apr. 8th by overpowering Clemson's Amy Hise and Laurie Stephan, respectively. Farmer dropped the first set to Hise, 6-7, but came on strong to win the last two sets, 6-1, 7-5. Kanell proved to be too much for Stephan as she defeated the No. 5 Tiger, 6-1, 4-6, 6-3. The Tar Heels fell to 17-7 for the

year, while Clemson improved its record to 15-8 going into the final round.

Baseball takes Jackets in 11

The North Carolina baseball squad, after losing two straight games to Georgia Tech on Friday (10-6) and Saturday (11-5), slid past the Yellow Jackets 12-11 in 11 innings on Sunday. Ron Maurer singled to center in the first inning, breaking Scott Bradley's

UNC record for a consecutive hitting streak. Maurer has now hit safely in the

Trailing 10-5 in the ninth inning, UNC scored six runs to take an 11-10 lead. With two outs, Steve Estroff smashed a three-run double, and then scored on a Mark Kingston double. Dave Arendas' single scored Kingston and gave the Tar Heels the slim one-run lead.

Estroff had a tremendous day at the plate, going 4 for 6 with five RBI, including his 13th homerun of the season, a solo shot in the fifth.

After Tech tied it in the bottom of the ninth, neither team scored in the tenth. Cy Richardson opened the Tar Heels' eleventh with a walk, and Todd Nichols sacrificed him to second. Darren Villani singled to right, but Richardson could not score on the play.

With one out, Dave Arendas, who had three hits in the ballgame, stroked

a drive down the firstbase line. While Richardson crossed the plate, the liner was stabbed by Tech's first baseman, who tried to throw Villani out at second to prevent Richardson's run from counting. The throw, however, sailed in to leftfield.

ond place, and teammate Allen Johnson finished sixth with a jump of 6'7", a personal best for the freshman from Fairfax, Va. At the pole vault, Maxwell Thompson cleared 16'7", the secondbest in school history and a personal best for Thompson.

Junior Eric Hichman's 8:47.20 in the 3,000-meter steeplechase is the fastest time in the conference this year, and second-best in school history.

In the decathlon, Dennis McGorty and freshman Paul Foxson finished first and second, respectively, with Foxson edging Georgia Tech's Joe McDonald by seven points, 6,833 to 6,826. McGorty's 7,092 points is a personal best, and ranks No. 2 in the UNC books, while Foxson's total fills the No. 3 spot.

In the throwing events Friday, defending champion Sean Murray finished second in the javelin with a throw of 223'9", two inches behind Virginia's Steve Kiessling. Harlis Meaders threw the shot put 51'2" to finish fifth in that event. Saturday, Meaders and Murray took second and fourth in the discus with throws of 175'9" and 170'6", respectively.

Craddock said that he was pleased with the men's showing, especially since the squad had some injuries. "Clemson just has too many bodies,

and we're not at State's level," he said.

"We just don't have that depth where we can leave guys at home and still win."

Also on Saturday, freshman Reggie Harris finished second in the 400meters, one-hundredth of a second behind N.C. State's David Fields, and third in the 400-meters (20.79). Harris also anchored the 400 relay team of Donald Colson, Johnson and Tyrone McFadden that finished third in 41.28 seconds. Clive Harriott, a fifth-place finisher in the 800-meters (1:51.66), ran lead-off for the mile relay team (Colson, Marvin Hembrick and Harris) which crossed the line in 3:14.46 for third place.
