UNC JV basketball gives small-college players big-college educations

By now, Pearce Landry could have lit up scoreboards all across the coun-

He could have jetted from Page High School in Greensboro and suited up for Davidson, or UNC-Wilmington, or even Harvard - traveled to places like Annapolis and New Haven and Princeton. He could have used his 3-point shot

to see the country. Instead, the freshman shooting guard has settled into his second semester at

North Carolina After forsaking numerous basketball scholarship offers in order to come to UNC as a Morehead Scholar, Landry has become a star, of sorts. He's established himself as perhaps the best player on the UNC junior varsity basketball

Now he's sitting back and waiting. Maybe next year, and certainly the year after that, Landry will get a shot at the varsity - a shot to travel to Atlanta and College Park and Madison Square Garden.

Maybe he'llmake it. Maybe he won't. It really doesn't matter.

After Cornell, his first choice, didn't accept him, the Greenville native decided to come to North Carolina.

Academics were a given. Claiborne's choice was which sport to focus on.

"Initially, I was supposed to play soccer here," the 6-foot-4, 196-pounder said. "But basketball is something I always loved, and I decided to go with it. I've always wanted to work hard at basketball."

That's the other constant on this team a love for the game.

In many ways, the JV team is structured like a Division III program. No scholarships are given to the players, and therefore they tend to keep a realistic approach to the game. They play hard; they practice hard; they love to win. But when it's all over, they hit the books, preparing for jobs as lawyers and doctors and coaches, or whatever else suits their aspirations.

The team's head coach, seventh-year varsity assistant Randy Wiel, beams about his former players' accomplish-

"One of the things I really enjoy," Wiel said, "is that over the last five years, five of the players are right now in medical school or doing their interns.

"That's always nice for a coach. I don't have to worry about their academ-

Beyond the books, however, still lingers the dream of basketball glory.

In a given week, the JVs practice as many hours as the varsity, although the JVs, unlike their scholarship counterparts, have longer breaks for holidays such as Thanksgiving and Christmas.

The JVs run many of the varsity plays, and when they lose, they swear and rant; when they win, they hoot and holler, just like the varsity.

"Some people think that it's just an intramural-type thing," Claiborne said. "But we go just as hard, just as long as the varsity does. We take it very seriously, just as if we were members of the varsity team here at the University." Unlike the varsity, which plays for a

conference and national championship, the JVs play just for the fun of it, really. Most ACC schools don't field JV teams, so the Tar Heels play mainly community and junior colleges. One or two prep schools also fill a year's schedule.

Traditionally, most of the JV players are freshmen or sophomores. The coaches keep it that way so as many students as possible can have a chance to play. After two years with the JVs, players receive a varsity tryout. Some players - like Travis Stephenson, Jason Burgess and Larry Smith on this


