JAMES SHEPARD BOWERS.

One of Scotland Neck's Most Prominent Citizens Passes Away.

Near nine o'clock on Saturday morning, the fourteenth instant, James Shepard Bowers breathed his last breath in his home in the town of Scotland Neck, after a lingering illness of many months. His death was therefore not unexpected, and yet it has cast a gloom over the entire community.

He was not quite forty-two years old, and from early childhood had been a sufferer from rheumatism, which had warped his slender frame and made him unable to fight life's battles as others could. In spite of this serious handicap, by the aid of indomitable and tremendous will-power, he has led an active life and made his influence felt.

For many years he was secretary and treasurer of the Scotland Neck Cotton Mills, and at the time of his death was a director in the Scotland Neck Bank and the Dixie Fire Insurance Company of Greensboro. He was identified with nearly every enterprise in this place and always lent aid to every undertaking that was for the development of his home town.

He was an active Mason, and the same spirit which made him prominent in business made him an enthusiastic Shriner. It was fitting, therefore, that he should be laid to rest by his brethren of that fraternity, and on Sunday afternoon at three o'clock his body was carried to the chapel in the Episcopal cemetery under the escort of not only members of his own lodge, but a very large delegation of brother Masons from Enfield, Weldon, Whitakers, Halifax and other places.

The funeral service was conducted by Archdeacon Hughes, of Raleigh, and at the grave the prayer was offered by Rev. O. L. Powers, of the Baptist church, after which the impressive service of the Knight Templars was held.

Seldom, if ever, has so large a crowd been known to attend a funeral here before. Many people from other towns were here, thus showing by their presence evidence of their tender regard for the memory of a once devoted and loyal friend. The floral offerings were both numerous and beautiful and the grave was left covered with flowers.

He was a devoted son and brother as well as husband and father, and leaves behind to mourn their loss a widowed mother, Mrs. Catherine E. Bowers; a faithful and devoted wife, Mrs. Lottie Bowers; three young sons, William Jesse, James S., and Franklin Augustus, and one daughter, Catherine; one brother and one sister living in Scotland Neck, J. E. Bowers and Miss Margaret Bowers, and two brothers living in Washington, N. C., Messrs. A. L. Bowers and B. E. Bowers.
