Mr. Hancock was one among our oldest citizens, being in his 74th year. He was born in Bertie county, near Lewiston, but came to this section 35 or more years ago.

Besides three sons, Messrs. W. M., H. T. and Lewis Hancock, of Scotland Neck, and one daughter, Mrs. D. M. Campbell, of Halifax, the deceased leaves a devoted wife to mourn the loss of a true husband and father.

The burial took place in the Baptist cemetery Friday morning, the service at the grave being conducted by Rev. J. E. Lanier, assistant pastor of the Baptist church.
