MULLINS TOBACCO MARKET.

Will Close on September 8th Owing to Short Season.

The following is from this week's issue of the Mullins (S. C.) Enterprise:

"Owing to the short crop of tobacco this season the market will close much earlier than it has been known to close before. At a meeting of the Tobacco Board of Trade a few days ago it was decided to close the market on September 8, as it was thought that the crop will be practically sold by that time. It is a short crop, and owing to the prevailing high prices farmers have marketed it about as fast as it came from the

THIS DATE IN HISTORY

- September 1.
- 1804—Planet June discovered by German astronomer Harding.
 - 1814—U. S. S. Wasp sunk H. M. S. Avon.
 - 1859—The Prince of Wales, later King Edward, laid corner-stone at Ottawa of the Dominion Parliament Buildings. The buildings, one of the finest examples of Gothic architecture in America, were burned last year, presumably by German spies.
 - 1863—Haytian insurgents proclaimed republic.
 - 1864—Birth of Sir Roger Casement at Dublin. Executed August 3, 1916, for high treason against Great Britain.
 - 1864—General Sherman defeated Confederates at Jonesborough.
 - 1870—Beginning of the Battle of Sedan, which ended the next day with a disastrous defeat of the French by the Prussians.
 - 1880—British possessions on the North American continent, with the sole exception of Newfoundland, annexed to the Dominion of Canada.
 - 1898—Fashoda, on the White Nile, occupied by General Marchand and a French force.
 - 1900—Transvaal annexed by Lord Roberts.
 - 1910—An insurrection in the Philippines, started by a deposed native provincial governor, was quickly suppressed.
 - 1914—Survivors of Russian North Pole Expedition at Archangel report death of their leader, Lieut. Sedov.

 - 1914—Russian Government changes name of St. Petersburg to Petrograd.
 - German's inflict serious defeat to the Russians at Allenstein, East Prussia, definitely checking advance of invaders.

DRAINAGE IN PENDER.

Movement on Foot to Dredge Long Creek Swamp.

The Pender Chronicle of Burgaw this week has the following of interest:

"That Pender county people are well awake to the possibilities of swamp lands, after they have been drained, is being simply demonstrated now by the desire which the people who live along the route of Long Creek are evincing to have that stream dredged so that the rich swamp lands adjacent thereto may be made fit for cultivation. The petition for the organization of this district has been pretty well signed already, not a single man refusing to put his name thereto. There are over five thousand acres of rich swamp lands along the run of this Creek, and there are 30,000 acres of savannah lands which will be helped greatly by the drainage of the same. The whole western area of Pender county will be benefited by this work, and the people of the Long Creek section deserve congratulations for their interest in this splendid project."

"Even though the crop was short, it will net the farmers nearly as much as the bumper crop of 1913. The Mullins market sold about 6,000,000 pounds that year at an average of practically 13 cents, or \$780,000 in value.

"This year the market will hardly sell more than 2,500,000 pounds and it is thought that the average will be around 18 cents, or \$550,000. Taking into consideration that this year's crop was made very cheap, it will really be worth more to the farmers than the 1913 crop.

"It is likely that next year the farmers will plan for a big crop, as the high prices have set many of them wild, but those in position to know declare that even with a big crop next year prices should be good, as the stock on hand is very short."

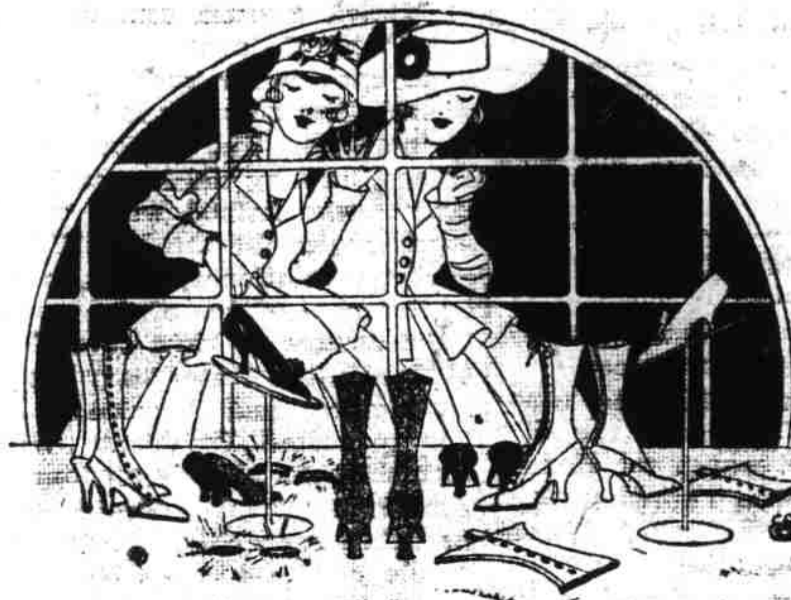
