COTTON. (By Associated Press.) New York, Sept. 13.—The cotton market opened firm, at an advance of 14 to 18 points today, responding to higher Liverpool cables and Liverpool buying orders, December sold at 15.48, and January at 15.54 on the call or 45 to 50 points above the low level of Monday. This advance seemed to attract realizing and prices eased off some 6 to 8 points shortly after the opening.

STOCKS. (By Associated Press.) New York, Sept. 13.—Prices tendered upward again at the opening of today's market, but the wide and general gains of the recent session were lacking and the undertone indicated a degree of irregularity. Shipping shares were active, Atlantic Gulf and West Indies recording a new maximum of 1 point advance to 90, with an equal gain for Pacific Mail, while Marine and United Fruit suggested realizing. American Smelting led the coppers, with an addition 2-point gain and motors, sugars and some of the equipments were materially higher. United States Steel made only moderate headway and rails were steady.
