THE CAPE ST. ELIAS LIGHT STATION, ALASKA

Washington, Sept. 23.—The Cape St. Elias Light Station, Alaska, was placed in commission on September 1, 1916, and the temporary light discontinued. This station is located on the south end of Kayak Island, on a shelf about 45 feet above sea level. The tower is square and supports a cast-iron watch room and second-order lantern, whose focal plane is 40 feet above the base of the structure and 85 feet above sea level.

This lighthouse will be one of the most important on the coast of Alaska, as it is the landfall light for vessels bound to Prince William Sound or Cook Inlet from either the Pacific coast of the United States or south-eastern Alaska. It has been constructed by the lighthouse service directly, which has maintained a force during the past two seasons at this spot.
