

SIX COMMITTEES HAND IN REPORTS

Campaign Will be Continued in Effort to Round Out the \$5,000 Goal Agreed On.

The campaign that has been underway for the past few weeks with the idea of raising funds for the purpose of advertising the candidacy of President Woodrow Wilson did not close last night as had been anticipated for the very good reason that the total raised is yet several dollars shy of the goal agreed on and the battle is to be continued through Monday in an effort to give Democrats a chance to do what New Hanover said she was capable of and determined to accomplish—to raise \$5,000 to be used in behalf of Mr. Wilson's return to office.

Five of the eleven committees reported to the treasurer last night and \$74 represents the extent of their activities. Chairmen of other committees had collected some money but for various reasons were not able to report and while the present total is only \$4,720, more than this has actually been raised. However, the present total is yet quite a distance from the amount agreed on when the campaign was launched, and Wilson Democrats are unwilling to call a halt until every effort has been exhausted in an effort to raise the sum agreed on.

Yesterday's contributions included amounts ranging from \$25 to one simoleon, and they came from men in every walk of life. The contributions were as follows:

KEEPING HISTORY STRAIGHT.

Wilmington, N. C., Nov. 4, 1916. Editor Wilmington Dispatch.

I dislike to appear in print, but a desire to "keep history straight" induces me to overcome my disinclination.

Your editorial of Friday commenting on the support of the President by the New York Evening Post cannot be considered a gain for his party, as that paper has supported the nominee of the Democratic party since 1884. In that year The Post bolted the nomination of Blaine and supported Cleveland with Harper's Weekly, the New York Times, Providence Journal and the Springfield Republican, those papers being known as Mugwump papers then, and since that time have become practically Democratic papers.

The present owner of the New York Evening Post is Oswald Garrison Villard, the son of a native of Germany, who was a protege of the late Carl Schurz, and who became a Wall Street magnate.

Another peculiar feature of the policy of this paper is that while the owner and editor is the son of a German he is, in the present crisis in Europe, pronounced pro-ally.

(If the acquisition of The Post cannot be considered a gain, why our Republican brother's worry? If merely to keep history straight, we fear he is guilty of an error of omission in that he neglected, first, to state that The Post had been independent in the present campaign up to the time of its decision the past week, and second, that The Post supported the same Charles Evans Hughes, Republican, for governor of New York, while The Sun and other plutocratic

Each, we suggest, found out its mistake. No doubt as Hughes welcomed the ardent support of The Post during the gubernatorial campaign he would welcome it during this presidential fight. We assume that our good friend overlooked the fact that The Post ardently supported Hughes for governor—before Hughes had been tried in public office.

If The Post is to be considered a mugwump because it opposed the Republican party in a National election, how about Citizen Roosevelt, whose stand at Armageddon four years ago is well, if not pleasantly remembered by the Republican brethren. In the same connection it might be asked if The Post is to be pronounced pro-Ally is not a confession in order that so is Roosevelt? At least The Post is for peace, while Roosevelt shouts for intervention in Belgium and seizure of German ships in American ports. And does not the evidence (not theory) show that Theodore Roosevelt is nearer Charles Evans Hughes than the New York Post is to Woodrow Wilson?—Editor The Dispatch.)

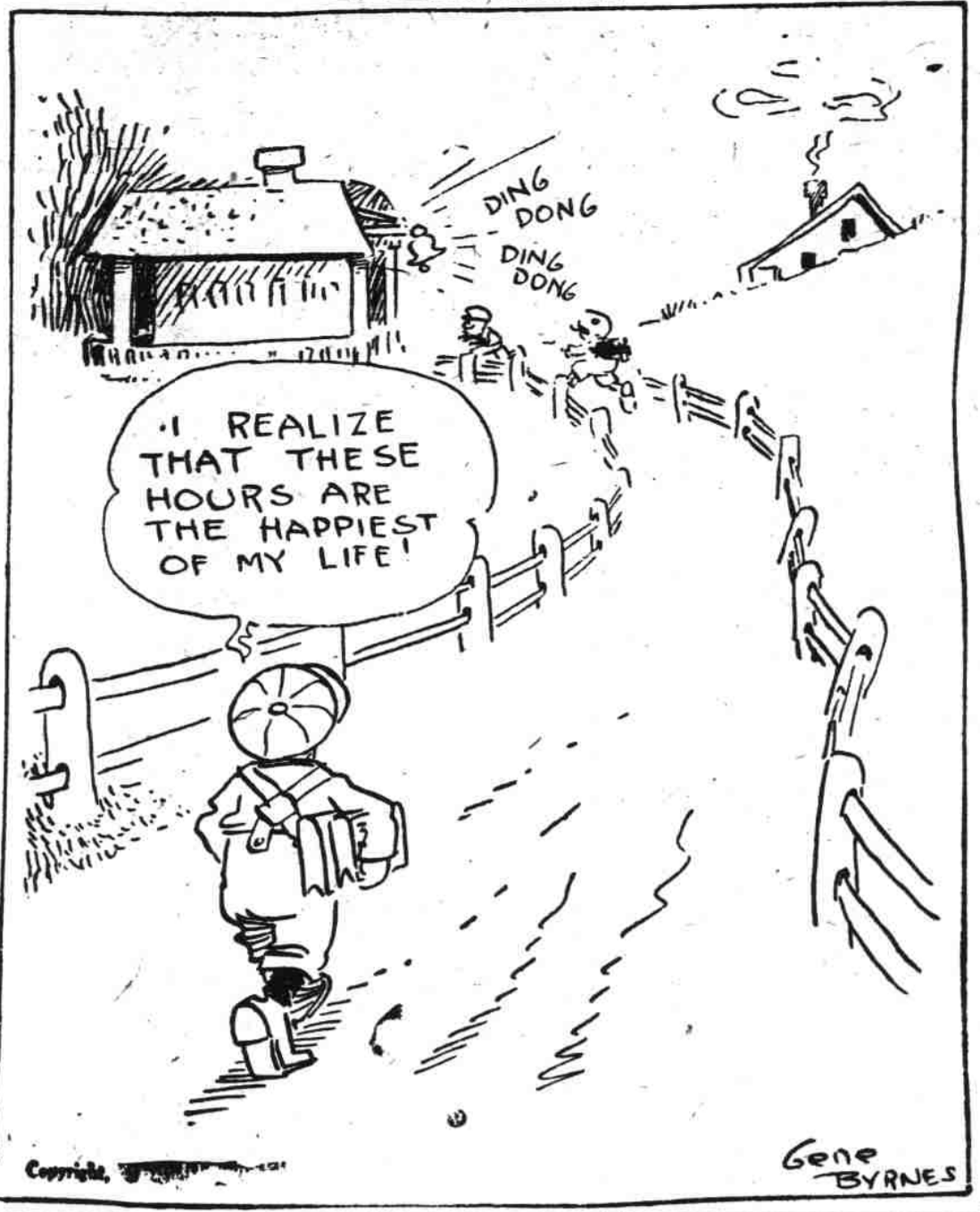
