St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 18.—The complete official vote of Minnesota as announced by the Secretary of State today gave Hughes a plurality of 396. The vote was: Hughes, 179,553; Wilson, 176,257.

(Carter S. Glass.) New York, Nov. 17.—Carter S. Glass, Congressman from the Sixth Virginia District, may be the next Secretary of the Treasury, according to a report current in Wall Street today and said to be from authoritative sources. Henry Morgenthau, former Ambassador to Turkey, is another alternative rumored as possible successor to William G. McAdoo, whom, it is said, will retire in order to conduct his business affairs.

Congressman Glass fathered the Federal Reserve Bill in the House, and at that time displayed an extensive and expert knowledge of finance. He is also a personal friend of the President. According to reports here it is firmly believed in Lynchburg, Va., Congressman Glass' home, that his appointment is certain, although the official announcement is not expected until after the first of the year.

COTTON

New York, Nov. 18.—There was a renewal of general liquidation at the opening of the cotton market today, but offerings were not heavy, as were yesterday afternoon's, and fluctuations were irregular. The opening was firm at a decline of ten points to an advance of 9 points, with January selling at 20.20 and May at 20.67 on the call. Offerings were taken better, however, and prices worked up to 20.46 for January and 20.72 for May or about 12 to 16 points net higher before the end of the first hour.

Kennebec opened at an advance of almost three points and Anaconda and Inspiration were higher one to three points, the last two at new high records. United States Steel also made a new maximum at 126 3/8. Other strong features were Republic Iron, Lacawanna Steel, American Can, Colorado Fuel, Marine, preferred, and United States Rubber. Bethlehem Steel rose to 700, an overnight gain of 20 points.
