Will Look Into Officers' Efficiency. Jacksonville, Fla., Aug. 11.—Secretary of War Baker has authorized General Wood, commander of the Department of the Southeast, to appoint an efficiency board of army officers to investigate into the qualifications of several officers of the new First Florida regiment of infantry. The appointment of the board was asked for by military officers and others in Florida, who are opposed to Colonel S. C. Harrison, as commander of the first regiment and also who look with disfavor on the selection of Sidney J. WEATHER LOOSENS GRIP; GREAT ARMIES RENEW ONSLAUGHT

(Continued from Page One.)

Today, despite counter-attacks launched by the Germans, who claimed ejection of the English in the region of Westhoek.

Heavy fighting was again in progress north of St. Quentin. Near Fayette, the war office announced that Germans were thrown out of a greater part of the gains they made on the nights of the ninth and tenth. South of Ailles, a brilliant attack won important trenches for the French. Several counter-attacks were repulsed.

The Germans launched an attack on a three kilometer front, after heavy bombardment, in the region of Cornillet. They made several attacks, coming forward in waves, but the French fire broke down the advancing lines with heavy losses. The French then advanced the line, repelling strong counter-attacks. The Germans raided Nancy from the air, but there were no casualties.

British aeroplanes bombarded the Ghistelle aerodrome, several railway stations and other military works. On the eastern front the Germans attacked in the Brody region. Their assaults were broken down, Petrograd reported.

The Rumanians have displayed stubborn resistance in the battle that is raging on that front. After giving way in the Suchitza river section, the Rumanians returned to the attack and regained the lost ground. At last reports the battle was still in progress.

A local reverse was reported by Field Marshal Haig tonight. "North of the Ypres-Menin road enemy attacks on our new positions, after heavy fighting resulted in pressing back our lines to Glencorse Wood," the statement said.

In the neighborhood of the Ypres-Staden railway to the right of Steenbeck, the British gained ground, the statement said.

CONGRESS HAS BIG TASK TO RAISE MONEY

(By United Press.) Washington, Aug. 11.—Congress, after months of war declaring, speech making and money raising, still faces the biggest part of its special session task—securing additional war revenue and appropriating billions of dollars more to maintain the military establishment of the country.

Three bills now are in Congress—the \$2,000,000,000 tax bill, general deficiency bill, with appropriations that may reach close to \$10,000,000,000, and the insurance bill with hundreds of millions of dollars to protect soldiers and families of soldiers from want in case of injury or death.

A fourth bill now is in prospect—a new bond bill, whose total will be at least \$5,000,000,000 and probably more. The shipping board will ask for approximately \$750,000,000 more this session.
