SWEDISH ATTACHE DENIES REPORTS

Says He Was Not Promised Nor Received German Decoration.

(By Associated Press.) Mexico City, Sept. 20.—Folke Cronholm, former attache of the Swedish legation, in a statement to the Associated Press today, denied that German Minister von Eckhardt offered or promised him a decoration in a German order or that he received any such decoration.

Previous to making this statement, Cronholm had maintained silence regarding the dispatch made public by Secretary Lansing, in which Minister von Eckhardt recommended Cronholm for a decoration. The statement follows: "I am not in a position to make any statement, being that this is contrary to the diplomatic principles of my country, as I am only an executive organ of my government and still ignorant of the statement that the same might have issued on the subject. Once in possession of an authentic text of such a statement, I may be able to add some complementary remarks."
