CANDIDATES WERE LET OFF LIGHT

"Fresh Meat" Did Not Perform Street Stunts—New Bern Notes

(Special to The Dispatch) New Bern, Dec. 7.—Much to the regret of local citizens who had anticipated being on hand and lending their assistance in making the occasion a grand success, the Shriners of Sudan Temple of the Mystic Shrine did not put the "candydates" through the usual street stunts.

This method was decided upon some time ago when the Shriners gave out a statement that until existing conditions became more favorable that they would not break into the routine of the every day life of the citizens in the towns and cities in which they met.

It was doubtless a relief to the candidates that this action was taken. While much of the cotton in this section has already been placed on the market and disposed of, local dealers declare that a large amount of the fleecy staple yet remains unsold and that this will doubtless be offered for sale during the course of the next few weeks.

At the opening of the season the growers placed but little of the staple on sale, preferring to hold it for higher prices. As soon as these began to be offered they began placing the cotton on sale and quite a large amount of it has been disposed of each day for the past few weeks.

The congregation of Christ Episcopal church, through their new rector, Rev. D. G. MacKinnon, D. D., has been in the city less than a week, and is lighted with his work and feel more certain now than ever before that they have secured a most valuable acquisition for the church.

Rev. Mr. MacKinnon came to New Bern with the highest of recommendations as being a rector of more than usual ability and there seems to be no doubt but that such is really the case.

Mr. Thomas Marriner, who for several years has held the position as conductor on the Norfolk Southern road between New Bern and Oriental, but who a few weeks ago was transferred to the Norfolk run, is to take his former run back.

Captain Aubrey Hawkins, who was formerly on the Norfolk run, has been placed in charge of that train again and Captain Marriner is to return to his former love.

When the 500 tons of coal which constituted the cargo of the American schooner William Cobb, now tied up at a Morehead City dock, are offered for sale at public auction on next Monday, December 10, it is very probable that either the town of Morehead City or Beaufort will be the highest bidder.

Both of these towns need coal in the operation of their light plants and as it will be a hard matter for a purchaser at some other point to secure coal to transport the "black diamonds" inland, it is probable that they will get the cargo.

Although the local exemption board has no definite idea as to when the next quota of registrants will be called for service in the selective draft army, it is believed that this call will be made within the course of the next two months and the board is all in readiness to carry out its part of the work.

They expect to be rushed to the limit, even more so than was the case during the period that the first quota was being attended to, but they are better organized now than was the case then and can handle the work more expeditiously.

MEDICAL EXAMINATION

Everybody Expected to Take Account of His Health.

Raleigh, Dec. 6.—"Today has been set apart," the State Board of Health says, for everybody to think about himself—not about his finances, his social standing or his relation to other people or things, but as to what he may count on in the number of years he expects to live. He is advised to think about his heart, arteries, kidneys, teeth, any prolonged pain, or any abnormal growth like a wart or a mole that is beginning to grow or change its shape. He is particularly advised to consider on this day the seriousness of lost weight, low blood pressure, a cough, or a slight fever in the afternoons. This usually means the beginning of tuberculosis—a stage which is easily cured if treatment is begun in time.

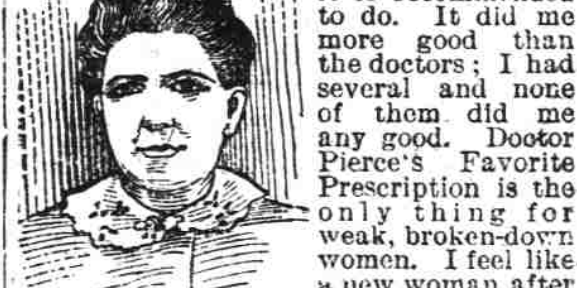
"A few years ago," says the board, "a man didn't want to know if his arteries were hardening, if his blood pressure was high or if anything was wrong with him inside. He seemed to prefer to travel life's road in ignorance and darkness to be cut down at an unexpected moment without warning or without remedy. Such a method of living is considered now not only unsafe but unsound. Applied to business it would wreck any firm or fortune as it used to wreck the most valuable lives, all unnecessarily. Men are now using the same common sense in keeping themselves well that they use in running their business; they are headed toward some disease they want to know it so as to take another course. 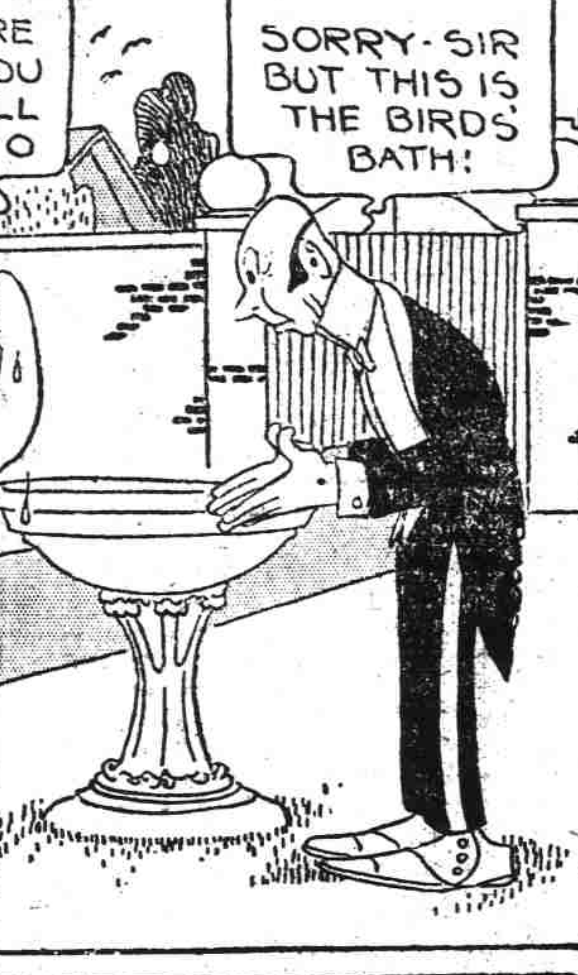
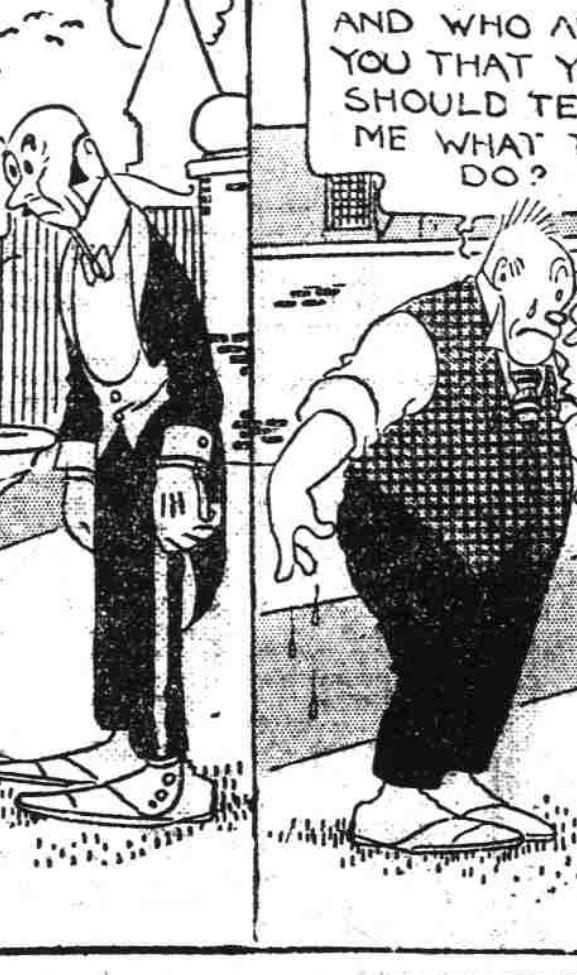
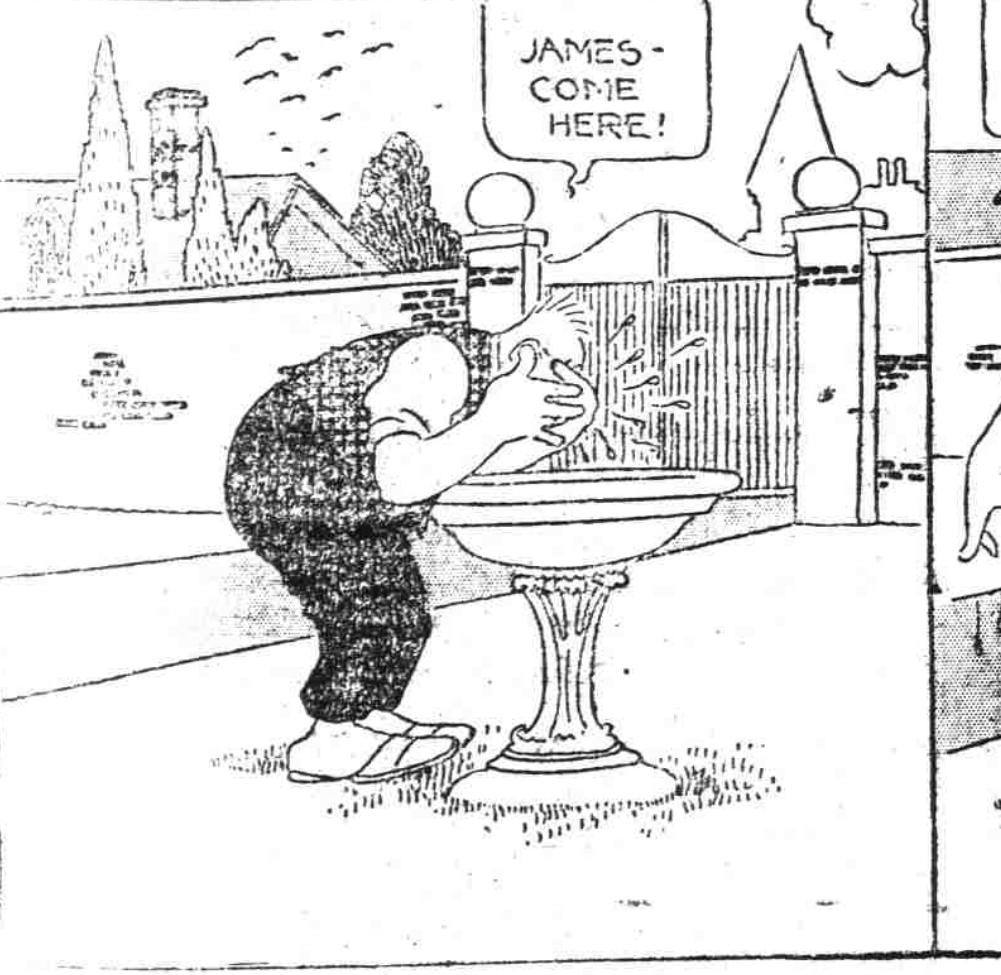
