FATAL COLLISION.

Automobile Ran Into Train, Killing Three Persons.

Barnwell, S. C., Feb. 12.—One woman and two men were killed and another woman was seriously injured here Sunday afternoon about 6 o'clock when an automobile in which they were riding dashed head-on into a westbound freight engine at the Atlantic Coast Line depot, where the railroad intersects the public road leading from Barnwell to Allendale. The dead are: Miss Ready, Fred Lee, white, and a negro named Johnson; injured is Miss Moody. All of the occupants of the car were from Kline and were on their way home when the accident occurred. The driver's view of the oncoming locomotive was obscured by a string of freight cars on the north side of the main line, and apparently with no thought of danger he approached the crossing at a rapid rate, according to the testimony of eye witnesses. So terrific was the impact that the automobile was totally demolished and the cowcatcher of the engine was badly damaged. The heads of both men were horribly crushed and their bodies broken, their death being instantaneous. Miss Ready lived for a short time, dying in the waiting room in the depot a few minutes after physicians reached the scene.

To Operate Model Farm.

Union, S. C., Feb. 12.—The Union Chamber of Commerce held a meeting Saturday night and elected directors to fill vacancies. The question of organizing a stock company to secure and operate a small dem-

onstrator farm under the management of the Chamber of Commerce was discussed and met with favorable consideration. The idea of this farm will be to foster the best and most helpful interests and to demonstrate latent possibilities in soil building, hog raising, poultry and the planting of peaches and grapes, raspberries, etc. The farm will also have modern appliances and perhaps a tractor; in short, those things which the changed and changing conditions make necessary in rural life.

SIX STILL CAPTURED.

Officials in South Carolina Hot After Moonshiners. Columbia, S. C., Feb. 12.—State constables under Chief Smyrle and government agents under the United States marshal, J. L. Sims, made a drive at illicit stills last week and the efforts of the officers unearthed six stills, five in Orangeburg county and one in Lexington county. Two of the stills captured by the raiding parties were of the copper still variety, and four were crude but effective outfits. The alleged operators were brought to the Richland county jail.

Much Whiskey Ordered. Columbia, S. C., Feb. 12.—Only 9,567 liquor permits have been issued in Columbia since January 1, and the sum of \$956.70 has been paid for the little slips which call each for a quart of whiskey at the express office. February is going fine as 2,458 permits were issued in eight working days. The office did not close on heatless days and the cash returns so far for February are \$245.80, over \$30 a day.

GRAVEN'S PATRIOTIC BOARD.

Exemption Board Completes Work Without Cost to Government.

New Bern, Feb. 12.—The Craven County Exemption Board has completed the classification of all of the registrants in the county and notice to this effect was telegraphed to the officials at Raleigh by Mr. T. G. Hyman, chairman of the local board. Not only has the classification been completed, but this work was done by the members of the local board without one cent of cost to the government, each one of the members declining to take any pay for their weeks of labor.

At a meeting of the chairmen of the Exemption Boards held at Raleigh some weeks ago, Mr. T. G. Hyman made a motion to the effect that the members do this work without pay. There were a few who were in favor of letting North Carolina set a precedent by taking this action, but others did not want to devote their time to the matter unless they received remuneration for it.

As a result of the discussion it was decided that those board members who desired to be paid for helping the government out in this matter could do so, but the Craven county board let it be known that they would not accept one penny for their work and no charge whatever has been made by them for the services which they have rendered.

Lincoln's Home City Pays Tribute. Springfield, Ill., Feb. 12.—Springfield today did honor to the memory of Abraham Lincoln. All State offices, banks, courts and schools in

the former President's home city were closed. The custom of celebrating the anniversary with an elaborate banquet was abandoned, however, in deference to wartime conditions. In place of the banquet the committee in charge arranged for two public meetings of a patriotic character.

Minnesota Democrats.

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 12.—Members of the Democratic State Committee rounded up here today to discuss preliminary business with regard to the coming State and Congressional campaigns in Minnesota. The proposal for a complete fusion with the Republicans on candidates whose loyalty record is above reproach is one of the live matters that is expected to receive the attention of the committee. While the proposal has been favorably received by some of the Democratic leaders it is not expected to receive the approval of the rank and file of the party. It is therefore considered likely that a State "conference" will be held some time next month to agree upon a State ticket to be recommended to the Democratic voters in the coming primaries.

Every School a Red Cross Center.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 12.—To make every school in the United States a Red Cross auxiliary is the aim of a campaign for booming Junior Red Cross membership, to be inaugurated today and continued over Washington's birthday. The movement originated with Dr. H. B. MacCracken, president of Vassar College and has received the endorsement of the National Red Cross and of President Wilson.

Hoboken Girl Weds War Hero. Hoboken, N. J., Feb. 12.—In the Church of Our Lady of Grace the wedding took place today of Miss Marion Fagan, daughter of Lawrence Fagon, for several terms mayor of Hoboken, and G. Parker Toms, a son of Mrs. Albert H. Brueggeman, of St. Louis. The bridegroom recently returned from France wearing the Croix de Guerre, received for rescuing wounded during a severe gas attack last August. He went to France in June as an ambulance driver with the Formation Harges. Less than six weeks after reaching the front he was badly "gassed" while caring for wounded, and was unconscious when rescued after saving many lives.
