NEW YORK COTTON

New York, April 18.—A further advance at a renewal of more or less general selling and was followed by a very sharp break in prices in the cotton market today. Relatively firm cottons and bullish overnight spot advances accounted for the opening advance of 4 to 35 points which carried July contracts up to 29.85 and December to 28.60 or 245 to 260 points from the recent low level. Offerings became very heavy at these figures, however, and the break was accompanied by renewed talk of price fixing or regulation of some sort in the goods market. Liverpool bought early but sold when the market weakened, and there was also trade selling on the decline which rapidly extended to 28.35 for July and 27.50 for October or 55 to 75 points net lower, and 92 to 110 points below the high level of the opening.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON.

New Orleans, April 17.—Irregularity prevailed in cotton in the early trading here today. War news was considered unfavorable, but sellers feared unfavorable weekly crop reports from the government. After a fall of about 10 points there was a recovery and a net advance of two points on October, but at the end of the first hour the market was off to a net decline of 16 to 31 points. Cotton closed steady at an advance of 56 to 91 points.
