NEW YORK COTTON

New York, April 20.—The steadier tone which was noted in the cotton market yesterday appeared to have gained strength over night. Bullish week-end figures, showing a larger decrease in the world's visible supply for the week than for the same week last year, the unfavorable weather news and bullish spot advices, probably encouraged buying for a reaction. The New Orleans market also showed firmness, while nervousness over the price fixing bill appeared to have almost completely subsided. First prices were 7 to 23 points higher with the new crop relatively firm on the fear of low temperatures over Sunday, and the general list sold about 48 to 77 points above last night's closing before the end of the first hour. Near months showed a relatively rapid advance after the call with July selling at 28.80 or 120 points above the low level of Friday, while October sold at 27.88.

New York, April 20.—Pools controlled today's stock market to a considerable extent, their operations embracing a variety of specialties, notably motors and subsidiaries, as well as equipments, sugars and tobaccos at extreme gain of 1 1/2 to 3 points. Standard shares were sluggish at the outset but came forward later. United States Steel rallied briskly from its slight reaction, making its best quotation of the week at a gain of 1 1/4 points. Rails also hardened after early irregularity. The closing was strong. Sales approximated 275,000 shares.

Oats gained strength on account of unsettled weather conditions. Advances in the prices of hogs gave firmness to provisions.
