SHERIFF CALLS HALT ON EVERY MOTORIST

A sign five feet high and 42 inches across has been prepared by Sheriff George C. Jackson with the idea of enforcing the law concerning lights on all motor vehicles, and owners of automobiles can have their lamps tested without cost by driving by the high school building, Ann street, near Sixth, either on Tuesday or Wednesday night. The test will be made by the sheriff and his men at that time and thereafter the law requiring that the beam from the light shall not rise more than 42 inches from the surface of the road will be rigidly enforced. In a statement given out during the afternoon the sheriff stated that he would be posted with his men and his sign on the various roads leading out of the city and that violation of the law would be dealt with. His way of expressing it was that if motorists who are complying with the law have tired of taking to the ditches through fear of those with blinding lights and it is time to call a halt. The section of the law dealing with this phase of the question reads: "A motor vehicle of any kind, operated on the public highways of the state shall not use any lighting device of over four candle power equipped with a reflector, unless the same shall be so designed, deflected or ranged that no direct light of the beam or reflected light when measured 75 feet or more ahead of the lamps shall rise above 42 inches from the level of the surface on which the vehicle stands under all conditions of load."
