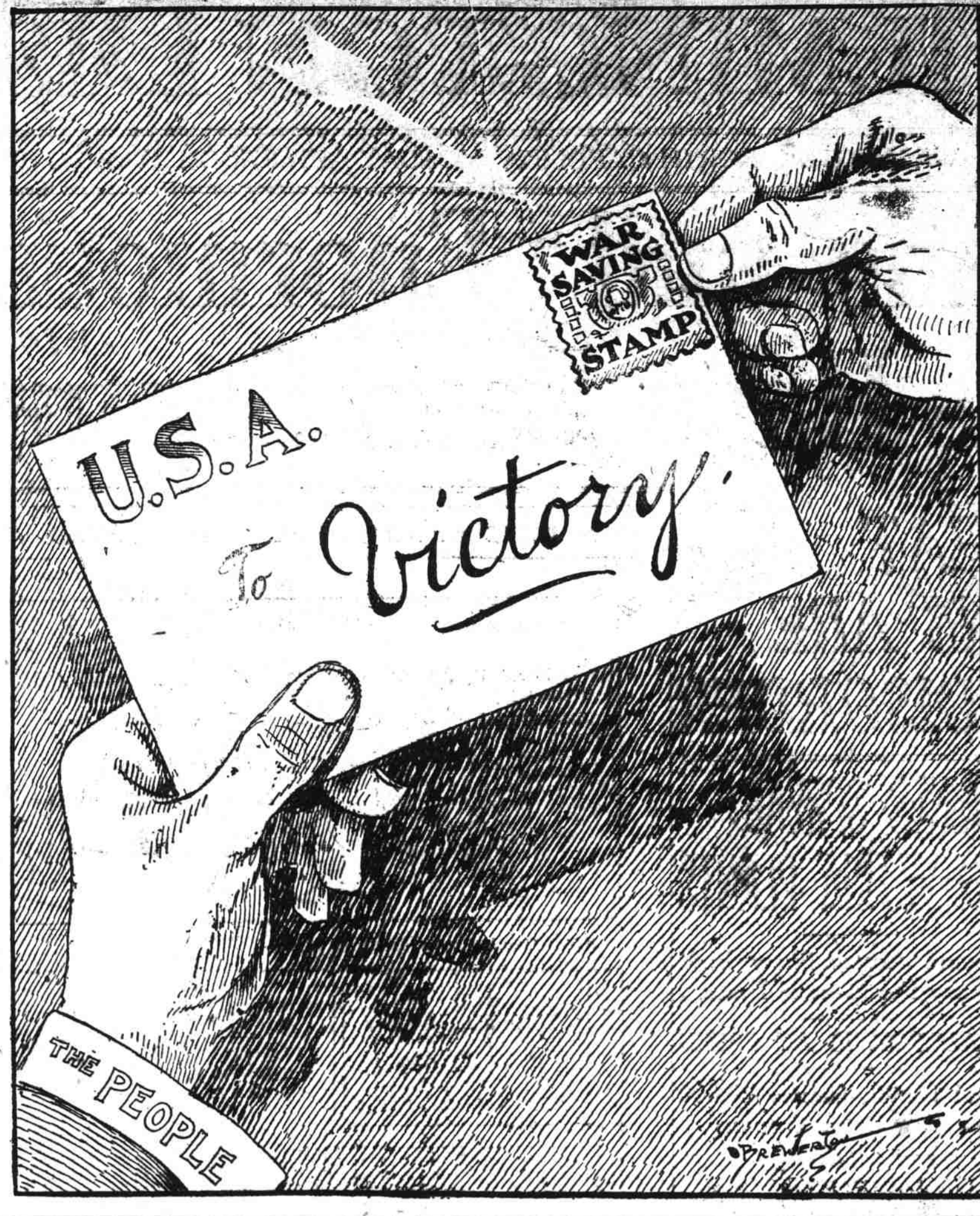

Brig. Gen. Benjamin D. Foulois, U. S. A., who has become chief of the American air service in France, is probably better acquainted with the practical side of military aviation than any other officer of the United States Army. Long before the war in Europe opened he had become an experienced aviator and was actively promoting aviation in the army. Gen. Foulois is a native of Connecticut and is in his 40th year. He is not a West Point graduate but came into the army as a cadet in the first regiment of engineers at the time of the war with Spain. After several years in the Philippines he returned to the United States, studied at the Army Signal School, and then was detailed to the signal corps. Since 1908 he has given his attention almost wholly to the development of the army aviation service.

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In Session at Aberdeen.  
 Aberdeen, Wash., June 24.—Royalty to the nation, the win-the-war spirit, and ways in which labor can help to win the war, are to be the leading subjects of discussion at the annual convention of the Washington State Federation of Labor, which opened here today and will continue during the greater part of the week. Reports to be presented to the convention shows that labor conditions in this state were never in a more satisfactory condition, owing to the increased volume of business in the shipyards, the lumber camps and other industries engaged in war work.

Partial Eclipse of the Moon.  
 Washington, D. C., June 24.—For the second time within two weeks persons interested in the heavenly bodies are to be given an opportunity tonight to witness the astronomical phenomenon which is commonly termed an eclipse. This time it is the moon which will hide her face for a brief period. The eclipse will be generally visible in the west part of North and South America, throughout the Pacific ocean and Australia. It is of comparatively little interest, however, as the shadow of the earth will cover only a very small portion of the moon's face.
