IS ATWOOD MACHINE IN GOVERNMENT POT?

Write-ups of New Single-Seat Aeroplane Gives Raleigh a Hunch—Creel Coming

(Special to The Dispatch)
Raleigh, June 25.—(By Staff) Write-ups of a new, one-seat aeroplane to be used in the war, coupled with an exceedingly great buy visit by all the men who possess likewise stock in the aeroplane factory here that is leading out a hunch that the Atwood machine is its name to the governmental pot.

Great Damage By Tempest.
San Salvador, June 25.—Great damage has been caused in Zacatecoluca and San Vicente by a tempest of unprecedented severity. Many houses were razed and a large area of the country at the foot of San Vicente volcano was devastated by an avalanche of volcanic mud from the slopes of the mountain. Many bodies of the people caught in the inundation have been swept down the Lempa river.

Body of Aviator Found.
Italian Headquarters, Monday, June 24.—The body of Captain Beneca, Italy's famous aviator, whose machine fell in flames inside the Austrian lines on June 21, after a battle with enemy aircraft, was found today during the Italian advance. The aviator's body was only slightly burned. The Austrians had removed the machine.
