# SCENES AT FASTEST 500-MILE RACE IN WORLD HISTORY



The 21st International Sweepstakes at Indianapolis May 30, fastest and most thrilling 500 mile automobile race in world history, brought the highest honor of racing to Louis Meyer, winner in 1928 and the only one except Tommy Milton to win the great race twice. He was driving the Tydol Special. The race set the amazing record of 104.162 miles per hour average, despite the fact that the cars carried two men and were limited to 15 gallons gasoline carriage, necessitating several stops. This average required terrific speeds on parts of the 2½ mile oval speeds that are said to go as high as 170 miles per hour.
