HOOD-MOORE ENGAGEMENT ANNOUNCED

The engagement of Miss Martha Lucile Hood, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Robert Hood, of Lawrenceville, Ga., to Mr. Joseph J. Moore, of Franklin, was announced Sunday in the Atlanta Constitution.

Miss Hood is a descendant of one of the oldest families of Gwinnett county, Georgia. Her maternal grandparents were the late Mr. and Mrs. John Griffin Lovelless, of Dacula. She traces her lineage to the Shockley and Hampton families of South Carolina, being a direct descendant of General Wade Hampton, of the American Revolution, and Wade Hampton, United States senator and governor of South Carolina.

On her paternal side Miss Hood is the granddaughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Duplap Hood, Mr. Hood having served the Confederacy during the War Between the States. Other forebears include the Gambles and Cousins of South Carolina. Miss Hood's only sister is Mrs. Paul Venable Kelley, of Lawrenceville. Her brothers are Hugh L. Hood and John J. Hood, of Lawrenceville; Robert Paul Hood, of Cleveland, Tenn. The bride-elect received her education at Bessie Tift College and the University of Georgia.

Mr. Moore is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John M. Moore, of Franklin, N. C. He is a descendant of the Higdons and Brysons on his maternal side, his grandparents being the late James Kennedy Bryson and Mrs. Bryson. His paternal grandparents were the late Mr. and Mrs. Jackson Moore, of Macon county.

Forebears of both branches were early settlers in Virginia and western North Carolina. His grandfathers served in the Confederate army, and he is a descendant of Major Daniel Bryson, of the Revolutionary war. Mr. Moore is a brother of Miss Ida Moore and John Moore, Jr., of Franklin.

The bridegroom-elect was graduated from Mercer University in 1929, where he made a good record in journalism as a newspaper feature writer, as a member of the Newsmen Club, and on the editorial staff of the Mercer Chatter.
