The Farmer's Question Box

Question:—What does sanitation in a poultry house mean?

Answer:—Sanitation means a lot to some poultrymen and not so much to others. We should use our common sense. Manure should not be allowed to accumulate on the dropping boards; litter should not become soggy and sour; drinking fountains should be cleaned once a day and sterilized once a week; clean nests should be the rule and the mash hoppers should

be scraped out occasionally, especially in damp weather. This is a good beginning in sanitation in the poultry house.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

The last Legislature enacted a law, by the terms of which persons owing taxes prior to the 1932 list are allowed to re-finance same by executing a note on the land, payable in five annual installments. In order to take advantage of this plan, it is necessary that the 1932 taxes of a taxpayer be paid. This law also provides that a taxpayer who owes taxes back of the year 1932 may pay same in cash, with interest and penalties eliminated, and will also receive a ten per cent discount deducted from the face amount, if they pay same prior to December 1, 1933.

Under the law covering the 1932 taxes, it will be necessary for the Commissioners, on the 1st Monday in August, 1933, to order the Tax Collector to sell the property of all persons who have not paid the 1932 taxes by that time.

The Legislature has given all taxpayers a chance to save their property, and it is the desire of the Commissioners to co-operate with the taxpayers in every possible way, in order to assist them in doing so.

If any taxpayer desires further information as to how to take advantage of either the cash payment plan or the partial payment plan, same may be secured from either the Tax Collector or from the County Accountant.

It is very important that each taxpayer who owes back taxes take advantage of one of the above plans at the earliest possible moment, as the law places a limit on the time in which a taxpayer may take advantage of these plans.
