W. C. GUFFEY William Calvin Guffey, 58, a resident of Fort Worth, Texas, for 35 years, dropped dead at his home on 1312 Orange Street, November 24. Mr. Guffey had risen to get a drink of water, relatives believe, when he was stricken with a heart attack.

A native of Franklin, N. C., Mr. Guffey owned a coal business when he first came to Fort Worth. During the war he founded the Acme Bottling company. In 1924 he sold the business and retired. He was a member of the Hemphill Heights Masonic Lodge and past chancellor of Red Cross Lodge, Knights of Pythias. Surviving him are his widow; three sons; George and Clarence, of Fort Worth, and Ralph W. Guffey of Dallas; three sisters, Mrs. Flora Conner, Spartanburg, S. C.; Mrs. R. H. Rogers, Franklin, N. C., and Mrs. D. W. Garland, Otto, N. C.

Funeral services were held at Gause-Ware funeral home with the Rev. C. E. Matthews officiating. Knights of Pythias were in charge of the grave at West Oakwood cemetery—Fort Worth (Texas) Daily News.

Mr. Guffey was born in Macon county, near Otto, N. C. In 1910 he left Macon county and became a resident of Texas. Shortly afterwards he married Miss Ella Davis, a native of Texas. For years he and his family have made it a practice to spend their summers in Franklin and have many friends and relatives here.
