The program of nuptial music was provided by Mrs. W. H. McMahan, pianist, and Mark Boesser, vocal soloist. Mr. Boesser sang the ever lovely "O Promise Me" (DeKoven) and "At Dawning" (Cadmian), accompanied by Mrs. McMahan.

At the sound of the first notes of the Bridal Chorus from Wagner's opera "Lohengrin" the wedding party proceeded to the altar. The bride, accompanied by her brother, Chauncey Cunningham who gave her in marriage, came down the steps and were met at the altar by Mr. Davis, accompanied by his best man, William T. Poindexter, who entered from the dining room. The vows were spoken in front of an improvised altar of palms, ferns, gladioli and Queen Anne's lace. 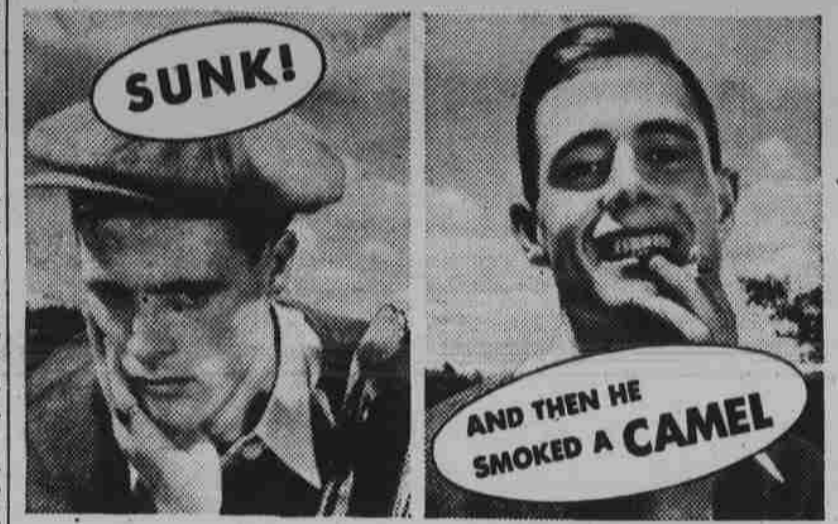
Dr. and Mrs. T. D. Slagle, of
