An examination of the votes tabulated above reveals that Roosevelt received 72 per cent of the votes, but this is too early to make any comments or observations. None of the votes received by this newspaper expressed a desire for the organization of a third party.

One voter, who favored the election of a Republican ticket, wnote on his ballot: "They freed the negroes; maybe they will free us." Another voter indicted this note on his ballot: "Until recently the constitution was safe in the hands of either party - now Roosevelt wants to tear it up. Still another vote said that if he should change his preference from Roosevelt he would favor Senator LaFollette or Senator Norris.
