Extend Time to Plant Soil-Conserving Crops

Winter legumes sown in October may be counted as soil-conserving crops under the 1936 soil-improvement program, according to J. F. Criswell, of State college.

The time allowed for seeding soil-conserving crops has been extended

to October 31, since many farmers have been handicapped by the weather, he explained.

He urged growers to take advantage of the time extension and sow enough conserving crops to qualify for the maximum payments possible for them to receive.

A change in the regulations, he added, now permits growers to meet their minimum conserving crop acreage requirements by sowing

winter legumes on fields where depleting crops were harvested earlier in the year.
