ADMIRAL McCULLY PREPARES TO GO TO SEA AGAIN

Of interest to Highlands people will be the following news which has been received relative to the activities of one of our most prominent summer visitors, Admiral Newton A. McCully.

He retired in 1931 as a rear admiral after 49 years of continuous service in the navy, but he has not lost the thrill of being a sailor.

Interviewed by a reporter of the Florida-Times-Union last week, Admiral McCully said "There's nothing better than to stand on the bow of a ship, no matter how small, and feel the spray of sea in your face." That's what he intends to do again in a month or so, when his 125 foot vessel is ready to go to sea again.

The officer bought a submarine chaser several years before he retired and converted it "to play around when I retired." When the Admiral retired he bought a place in St. Augustine, Fla. "I hunted high and low for a place where I could put my old sub-chaser right in my back yard. I found it, and aboard it I have spent many happy days."

The boat has been out of service almost a year, and he has taken it to Jacksonville to have it overhauled for use this year.

SCHOOL NEWS

Of particular interest in the sixth grade is the increase in the skill of the pupils in archery. This game is being enjoyed by the sixth graders and some are becoming quite proficient. The sixth grade room has many attractive features. A miniature garden in a bowl and the garden in the greenery are flourishing. On the wall are several motifs which have been drawn, cut and pasted by the students. Books and magazines of interest are being added to the book-shelf.

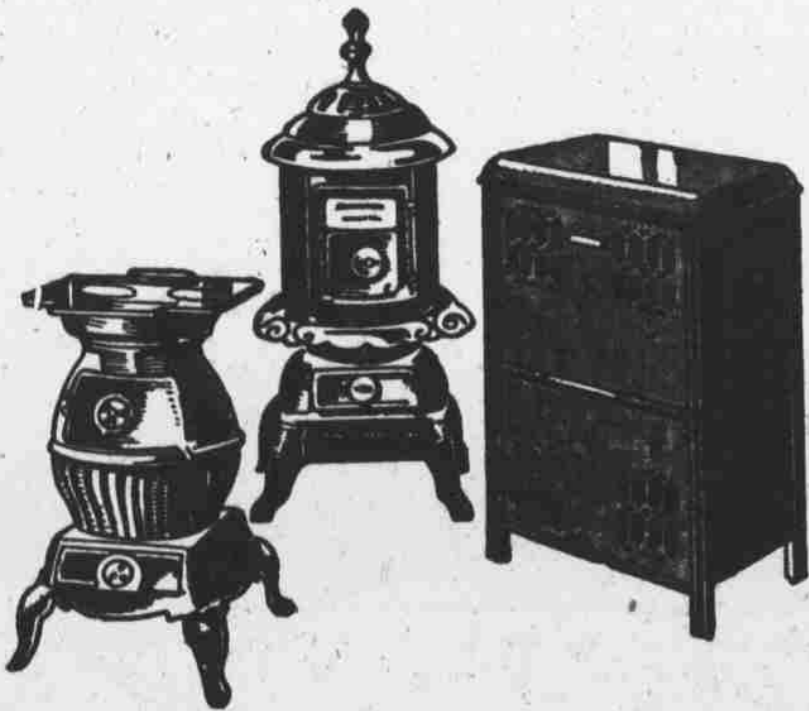

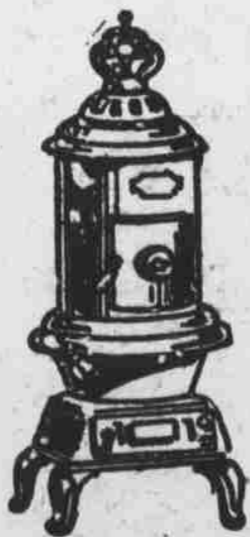
