Capt. R. H. Dillard

Awarded Silver Star For Gallantry

Captain Robert H. Dillard, US-MC, son of Mrs. J. C. Dillard of Macon, Ga., and the late Mr. Dillard, former residents of High-lands, has been awarded the Sil-ver Star medal for "galkantry" and intrepidity in action in the Solo-mon Islands, last November", according to a clipping from the Macon (Ga.) Telegraph. Captain Dillard is the grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Dillard of Dillard, Ga., and a nephew of C. R. Dillard of the E. H. Brown store here. He was a graduate of Mercer University.

The citation said in part: "Captain Dillard, in command of one section of guns from a weapons company, was attached temporarily to a battalion at a site near the airfield in Guadaleanal. In the heat of battle, the officers senior non-commissioned officers of this infantry company all be-came casualties. Captain Dillard was immediately ordered to take charge of this company in addition to his gun section, which he did in an efficient manner and directed the final stages of the assault and the mopping up oper-

"The Marine officer was under heavy enemy machine gun and mortar fire during the entire operation, and he carried out his duties with great efficiency and display of force and leader ship, with total disregard for his personal safety."

MRS. COBB CLUB HOSTESS


