5th War Bond Sales Go Forward Steadily In Co.

Power Co. Is Over Top 100 Per Cent; Sales Reach \$75,000

The report of War Bond sales is approximately \$75,000 to date. The last official report from Richmond was approximately \$48,000 last Friday.

Henry W. Cabe, county War finance committee chairman, said the E bond sales have not been as good as in previous campaigns but, that sales were going forward steadily and he was confident that the quota would be met.

Power Co. Goes 100 Per Cent Since last week when it was announced that the Zickgraf Hardware Company employees had purchased bonds 100 per cent and met their quota, the Nantahala Power and Light company employees have also purchased bonds 100 per cent.

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York was nominated by the Na-tional Republican Convention meeting in Chicago. The vote was 1056 to 1, the latter vote being cast by Wisconsin for General MacArthur.

Gov. Bricker, also was a candidate for the nomination but withdrew after Governor Warren of California declined to allow his name to be placed before the convention for the vice presidential nomination. Gov. Bricker was then unanimously nominated to the second place on the ticket.

Was Previously Reported Missing Over Germany On May 24

Mrs. J. Fred Gray, of Frank-lin, received a telegram Monday from the International Red Cross, through the War Depart-ment, stating that her husband, Major Judson Fred Gray, had been killed in action. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Javan J. Gray of Franklin, route 2. He had been previously reported missing in action on May 24. Mrs. Gray also received a message from Mrs. Gordon Davidwife of Captain Gordon Davidson, a member of Major Grays crew, stating that her husband also had been killed.

A graduate of Clemson Col-lege, Maj. Gray resigned a position with the South Carolina Extension Service in September 1940 to enter the air forces. He was graduated from Kelly

Field, Texas, in April 1941, where he received his wings and commission as a second lieutenant. Maj. Gray was then assigned the duty as flight instructor at Randolph Field for about a year before being sent to Hendricks Field, flight training on Flying Fortresses. He was commissioned a first lieutenant in September 1942 and received his promo-tion to captain in February 1943. In March 1943 he was assigned to a bombardment group at Blythe, Calif., as a squadron commander. He was stationed at Geiger Field, Spokane, Wash., and at an Army Air Base at Rapid City, S. D., prior to leav-ing for overseas duty in April of this year.

In addition to the widow, the former Miss Louise Blaine, and his parents, he is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Elmer Crawford of Greensboro, Mrs. Ross Davis of Demorist, Ga., and Mrs. Gus Baldwin of Columbia, S. C., and one brother, Elam Gray of Wilmington, Del.
