KILLED IN ACTION, JULY 11 County Meets Quota of \$7,000 For Relief Organization

> "Macon County has not fail-failed; its \$7,000 quota in the United War Fund drive has been raised." Chairman John M. Archer, Jr., was all smiles when he made this statement a few days ago. A week ago his expression was anything but nappy when he reported that \$2,500 had to be raised during the remaining ten days of the

"It has been an uphill fight this year," said Mrs. Archer, but now that we have succeeded I don't mind telling you that at times I was dubious about the final outcome. Our quota was more than double that of last year which was a real big order. This meant that we had to stress the idea of having everybody if possible, double their 1943 donation. The generosity of business houses, clubs, and many individuals who met this challenge balanced the smaller donations of those who were unable to donate as much or more than before."

The total reported to Mr. Archer on October 31 amounted to \$7,047.64, with returns from a few of the rural sec-tions not yet complete. He feels that the final figure will be

in the neighborhood of \$7,200.

Mr. Archer desires to express his thanks through this me-dium to all who assisted in the drive. He realized from the beginning that it would be a difginning that it would be a dif-ticult, and sometimes a dis-couraging task to many, as it was inevitable that many would feel that victory was just around the corner and that there would be no need for relief funds. The national neadquarters in New York headquarters in New York have already publicized the fact that their activities will continue for at least two years after the defeat of Germany, and perhaps a full year after the defeat of Japan. The problem of backing up the morale of our boys after the let down following victory and the slow return to their homes is realized by the National Council and plans are now being drawn to meet this situation.
