OLD HOUSES NEVER DIE-The ancient dwelling shown above, had it been capable of speech, probably would have related much of the forgotten history of Macon County. The past tense is used, because the structure, built by Capt. William Siler in 1822 for his bride, has bowed out to make way for a modern house. It was entirely hand constructed by Capt. Siler and an Indian named Billie Peckerwood. The mammoth logs used in its construction, remarkably preserved, still bear axe marks. Built when this county was nothing but wilderness, and truly a pace setter for other houses, the Siler home was the first in this area to have glass windows, and it is believed to be the first two-story home in the county. The house remained in the hands of Siler descen-dants until it, and land in the Cartoogechaye section, was purchased by Dr. Frank M. Killian a few years ago. The ancient landmark just recently was razed and a new building will soon be going up on the site. However, Captain Siler's hand-made furniture, truly a work of art, is still within the Siler clan.
