Being five (5) acres of land carved from Southern and Western part of the 17 acre tract of land described and conveyed in the deed from S. P. Pierson to the Macon County Board of Education, dated June 1, 1946, and recorded in Book P-5 at page 253, records of Macon County, N. C., situated in the Town of Highlands, Macon

County, N. C., more particularly described as follows:
