

5-Point Legislative Program To Be Sought By Education Forces

A five-point basic legislative program has been adopted by the North Carolina United Forces for Education, according to H. L. Bryant, chairman of Macon County's recently formed Citizens Committee for Education.

The two cooperating groups represent a wide variety of agencies and organizations interested in education.

The local committee will meet January 31 to consider the five-point program, it was announced.

The program, it was explained, to eliminate the continuing shortage of white elementary teachers; guarantee that every child shall be taught by a properly qualified teacher supplied with adequate instructional materials; and make sure that no child is denied the privilege of attending school in a building that is safe and sanitary.

The five legislative goals are:

"1. The immediate reduction of class size from 32 pupils per teacher to 30 pupils per teacher, based on average daily attendance, and the reduction to 25 pupils per teacher as soon as possible.

"2. A salary schedule of \$2600 to \$4100 for A certificated

teachers, as a minimum, based on present conditions with commensurate increases in salaries of other school personnel. The salary schedule for A certificated teachers shall be based on not more than 12 increments. (The present salary range of A-certificated teachers is \$2,200 to \$3,100.)

"3. Sufficient funds to employ an adequate number of properly qualified attendance enforcement personnel.

"4. Appropriations not only to meet increased costs of current expense items but also to provide additional required services and supplies (such as improved janitor and maid services, clerical aid for schools and more instructional materials.)

"5. Capital outlay funds by bond issue to complete the present school building program, these funds to be distributed on the basis of need and ability to provide."

In addition to these five "basic legislative" goals, the United Forces declares that, "if public education is to continue to keep in step with and contribute to the expansion of the state, economically, agriculturally, and industrially," these additional

Extended term of teachers' employment; adequate sick leave and retirement benefits; improved employment security; continuation and expansion of the present programs in school health; special education and vocational education; and an adequate supply of school buses.

Livestock Marketing Discussed

A new bulletin on "Livestock Marketing Agencies in North Carolina" has just been published by the North Carolina Experiment station.

The publication covers types,

number, and location of livestock marketing agencies; volume, seasonality; and type of livestock handled by type of market, source, disposition, and destination of animals, methods of transporting livestock to and from marketing agencies; physical facilities and practices of market agencies, and public regulation of livestock markets.

The study was made by Walter P. Cotton, associate professor of agricultural economics. The bulletin is part of a long-range research program on livestock marketing by the experiment stations of several Southern states. The efforts are being coordinated through a Southern Regional Technical committee, in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

Some of the conclusions reached by Mr. Cotton are that many of the markets are too small, most sales are not made by grade, and shrinkage of animals bought at auctions is excessively high.

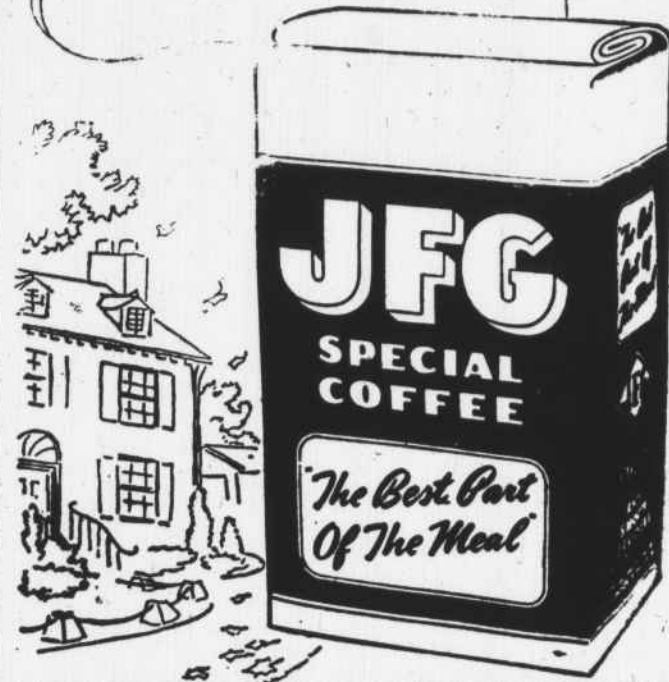
