

## Champion Truck Driver Says 'Consideration For Others' Is First Rule For Safe Driving

ATLANTA.—A champion truck driver today said that "the simple everyday application of the Golden Rule" would be the greatest single contribution all

highway users could make to solve America's traffic accident problem.

In an interview, James E. Tucker, 1951 National Truck Roadeo champion, who drives for a Charlotte trucking company, called for "greater consideration of others". He said that "on the road all drivers should display the same courtesy shown others while going through a revolving door."

Having earned top honors in the North Carolina Truck Roadeo in Greensboro last summer, Mr. Tucker entered the National Truck Roadeo in Chicago and took first place as a "straight truck" driver. He competed against drivers from all parts of America. He is the second North Carolina truck driver to win National roadeo recognition during the past five years.

## DEATH CLAIMS NIMROD STILES

Prominent Florida Man,  
Native Of Macon, Is  
Dead At 57

Nimrod H. Stiles, Macon County native who left here as a young man to become prominent in the business, civic, and church life of Haines City, Fla., died at his home there last Thursday. He was 57 years old. Mr. Stiles had suffered from a heart affection for several years, and retired from active business life sometime ago. On recent visits to Franklin, however, he had appeared remarkably well.

After attending the public schools here and Carson-Newman college in Tennessee, he was graduated from Wake Forest college.

Successful as a business man in Haines City, he served that community in many capacities. He was city commissioner for six years, served two terms as mayor, and was chairman of the building committee of the Haines City Baptist church. A Rotarian for 25 years, he served as president of the Rotary club in his home town. He was a York Rite Mason and a Shriner.

He was a director of the Reynolds Brother Lumber company at Albany, Ga., a partner in the Polk County Fertilizer company, and until recently was owner of the Highlands Wholesale Grocery company at Haines City.

Survivors include his widow, the former Miss Betty Saunders, of Evansville, Ind.; a son, James Daniel Stiles, who is a student at Wake Forest; and two sisters, Mrs. E. C. Cooper, of Franklin, and Mrs. Clara Neu, of Georgetown, Ohio.
