1/2 lb. of butter or margarine
1/2 lb. of sharp cheese
1/2 lb. of flour (2 cups)
Grate cheese and cream with butter and flour. Just knead until all ingredients are well blended. Then roll out into a long roll and roll in wax paper. Can be kept in ice box until ready to bake. This sometimes has to be chilled before it will slice. Bake in oven at 450° until done. They do not get very brown.

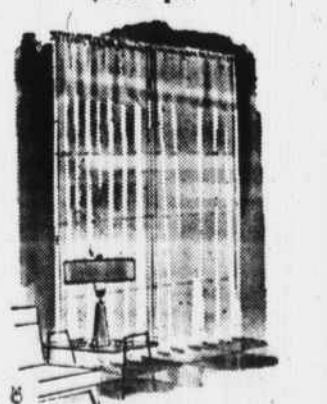
