Dr. Winstead Returns From Florida To Set Up General Practice Here

Dr. George Ashby Winstead, who has been in private practice in Panama City, Fla., for the past four years, has opened offices in Franklin for the practice of medicine. His offices are in the Asher Building, over Belk's Department Store. A native of North Carolina, Dr. Winstead at one time was associated with Dr. Furman Angel here.

The doctor said he plans a general practice, in addition to Urology a field in which he specializes. A graduate of Wake Forest College and the Duke University School of Medicine, Dr. Winstead interned at the U. S. Marine Hospital, Seattle, Wash., followed by 43 months in service. After being discharged, he was resident on surgery for 15 months at St. Joseph's Infirmary, Atlanta, Ga.

He was then associated with Dr. Angel here for a year before returning to Atlanta as resident on Urology for three years at Grady Memorial Hospital and the Emory University School of Medicine. From here he went to Panama City.

He has written and had three papers published in the "American Journal of Urology" and one paper in the "Urologic and Cutaneous Review".

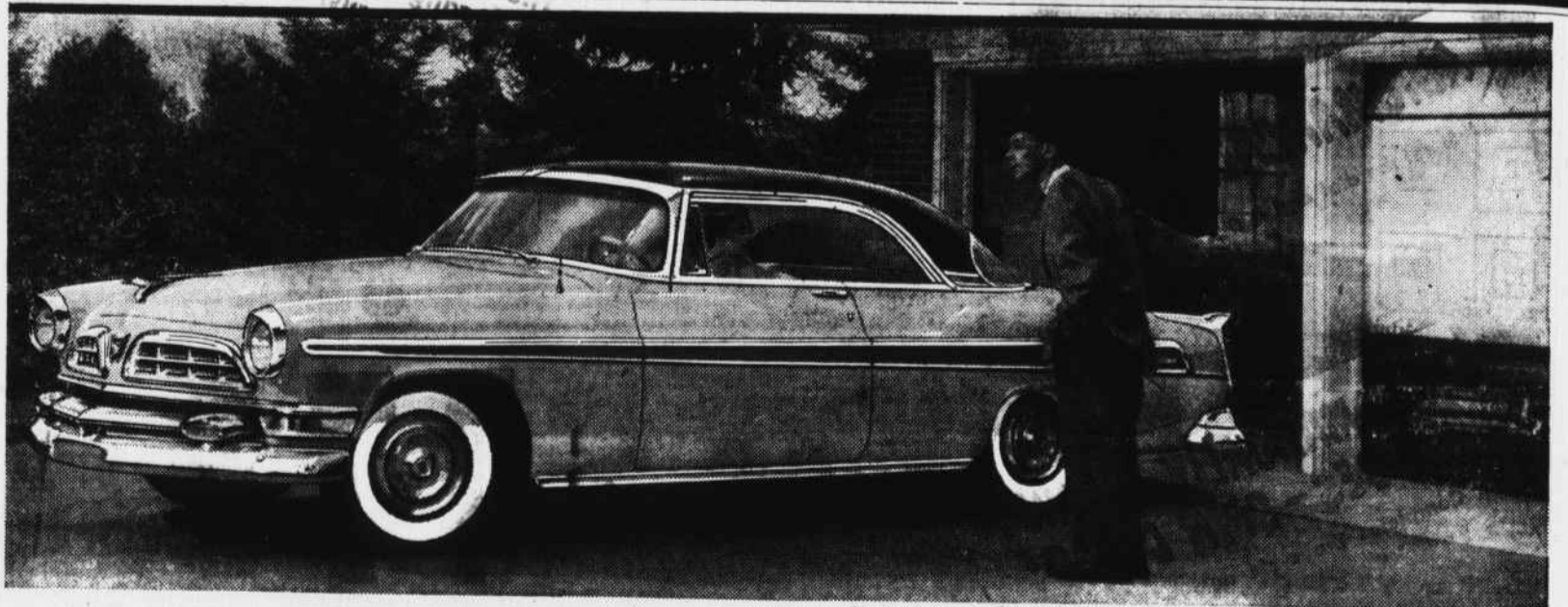
