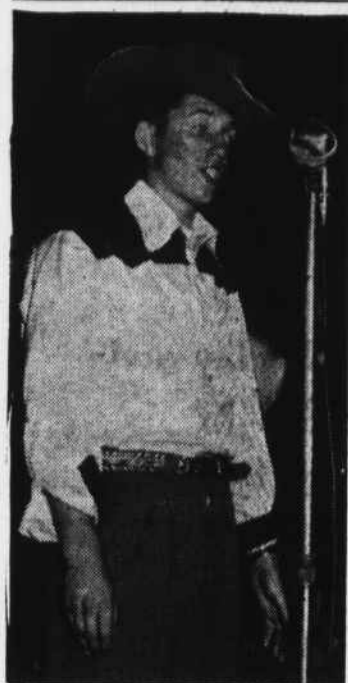

#### Ice Box Cookies

- 1 cup butter
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 2 eggs slightly beaten
- 1 t. vanilla
- 1 t. salt
- 4 cups flour sifted
- 1 t. soda
- 1 t. cream of tartar

Cream butter and sugar add eggs, salt. Add flour gradually which has been sifted with soda and cream of tartar. Form in long rolls and chill. Slice and bake. These may be kept in refrigerator and baked a few at a time.
