Loan Company Offering New Type Of Stock Here

Under amendments to its charter, the Macon County Building and Loan Association is changing the type of loans it will make and offers a new, additional type of stock in the organization.

Hereafter, officials explained, only direct reduction loans will be made. Under that plan, repayment of principal and interest, will be in equal monthly installments. To obtain such a loan, it is no longer necessary for the borrower to own stock in the Association.

The new type of stock available is called optional shares. It may be bought at any time (instead of only quarterly) and can be bought in any amount of \$10 or multiples of that amount. It will pay the same dividends as full paid stock, which is now earning 3 1/2 per cent; it may be withdrawn at any time.

The Association already was offering two types of stock, installment of thrift stock, payable at so much a week, and full paid stock. The latter type is bought outright at \$100 per share.
