Mr. Parker is being cast in the role of Yankee Capt. J. J. Andrews, who, with a group of volunteers, stole "The General" in a raid plotted to sabotage the railroad between Marietta and Chattanooga. Mr. Hunter is playing the part of Confederate Capt. W. A. Fuller, who chased the stolen train in "The Texas".

Chosen because of its rustic setting and wooden trestles, the section of Tallulah Falls track from the "Y" to Clayton has been transformed into a bygone area by the magic of the Disney technicians.

Special sets (most of them are shells of authentic buildings) dot the landscape.

Spectators Marvel

Spectators continue to marvel at the authenticity — the fresh lumber that before their very eyes was transformed into weathered and almost dilapidated walls in a set; fresh paint which mysteriously faded and peeled in a matter of minutes to blend with the scene; fresh brick that became rounded and worn almost with a wave of a worker's hand; a new picket fence that one minute was strong and sturdy and the next appeared ready to collapse under the breath of a gentle breeze. This is the abracadabra of Hollywood.

But the old wood-burning steam engines being used in the chase are real. They're the old timey work horses, and the withdrawal by most railroads of steam engines makes them even more popular, since any number of the younger generation has never seen a "steam puffer".

If, and when, the weather breaks and filming begins, the Disney company expects to be here about 30 days.

Asheville Man Will Do Honors At Dedication

Dedication of Carson's new community building is planned Saturday evening with Morris L. McGough, of Asheville, doing the honors.

Mr. McGough is executive vice-president of the Asheville Agricultural Development Council.

A supper, to which the public is invited, is set for 6:30 at the new building as a preliminary feature of the dedication. A small charge will be made for the meal, according to community officers.

At the dedication, special recognition will be given A. B. Slagle, who donated the land for the building, and W. W. Reeves, Franklin hardware merchant, for his cooperation in the building program.

The young people of the community are to be in charge of the evening's program.

The Rev. A. Rufus Morgan, Episcopal rector, will lead the devotional prior to the opening of the ceremony.

Practically all labor in erecting the 28 by 60 foot one-story building was donated by citizens of the community and friends. More than \$3,000 was expended by the community for materials. Construction was started in the spring of 1934 and regular meetings were held soon after it was roughed in. As funds became available, phases of the building program were completed. In addition to a large meeting hall, the building has a kitchen and rest rooms.

A plea for clothing to restock the rapidly diminishing supply in the "Children's Clothing Closet" has been sounded by the Franklin Junior Woman's Club.

During August, 3.5 miles of road work was done by the State Highway Commission in this county, according to a report from the district commissioner, Harry E. Buchanan.

Forces strengthened the existing surface with traffic-bound macadam of the following 12-foot wide secondary roads: Jones Creek Road, for 1.6 miles, and Walnut Creek Road, 0.7.

County-wide, a total of 1.2 miles of secondary roads, all 12 feet wide, were spot patched by the highway crews.
