In Fire Season

The spring fire season (Feb. 15-June 1) is here, and unless Maconians are very careful when burning brush, the county may lose its good record in forest fire prevention.

Fire prevention is a big business and unless it is handled properly, our natural resources can go up in smoke.

Our timber is a crop, a valuable crop in many ways, not only in dollars and cents, but in pleasure and recreation. It's everyone's responsibility to keep it green and growing.

Timber must be treated as a crop if we wish to harvest it. An average of seven babies are born every minute of the day. One baby born today creates a lifetime demand for at least 15 tons of paper — a product of the tim-ber crop.

Paper mills must expand and

double output over the next 20 years, but where is that wood coming from if we don't boost the timber growth and output?
