

an indirect part in the establishment of the Woman's College of General Assembly appropriated the University of North Carolina, \$14,000 which, with a donation at Greensboro.

The story is unfolded in the current issue of North Carolina Normal and Industrial College. Education magazine in an article tracing the one hundred years of organized teaching in this state.

Organized in an assembly, the of North Carolina." teachers held their meeting at Black Mountain in 1885, and it was there that Macon County, through its superintendent of schools, played a part in North Carolina's educational progress. Here is the account from the magazine:

#### Resolution

"On June 18, 1885, the superintendent of Macon County schools, A. D. Farmer, offered a resolution requesting the state to provide training for young men and young women who wanted to become teachers. This resolution was made a special order for consideration the next day.

"In support of his resolution. Mr. Farmer explained that the chair of pedagogy (teaching), established at the University at Chapel Hill, was excellent, but failed to meet the needs of the time, since women were not allowed to enter the University.

"After discussion . . . the reso lution was unanimously adopted. It appeared that little, if anything, was done to carry out the intent of the resolution.

"Nevertheless, the final chapter was written in 1891, when the
