Of "Auntie Mame", Mrs. Murray said: "It's a new book but the copy we have is almost worn out." The book has been made into a Broadway play and is a hit.

The Times carries a second list of 16 books, in a general field. None of these volumes are on the shelves of the Franklin Library. However, Mrs. Murray said she hoped to get soon "The Nun's Story", by Kathryn Hulme, currently near the top of the best-

A book not on any national rating chart but well read here. according to Mrs. Murray, is "Green Pond". This novel by Evon Brandon, is the story of two generations of doctors at Green Pond (Gastonia, N. C.), from the Civil War to the present.
