they were not all they could be— in fact, they seemed to fall back momentarily behind the fast-shifting tides. Had their leaders failed them? Were they sufficiently imbued with the vision of what North Carolina could become? Had they let the state live on its fat? Would the issues of a new day—the need for adjustment in race relations, the call for new industrialism and diversified agriculture — throw these people backward instead of forward?
It did not seem likely that Tar Heels who had wrested so much from so little (they had no gold-plated natural resources) would sink back into mediocrity. They required leaders with vision; they required initiative to shore up a shaky economy. But of all the Southern states, North Carolina still had more potential for greatness than any of her sisters.
If this is what the strolling troubadours from the haughty Byrd to the kindly Pierce have been trying to tell us, then perhaps the myths are true. North Carolina is strong in the strength of her people. They will see her through.

Franklin Would Be Head Office Of Proposed Family Court System

Franklin would be head office for eight-county District One if a proposed system of state-administered and financed family courts is passed by the General Assembly.
The new court plan is recommended by the Governor's Youth Service Commission and would establish 18 family courts.
The courts would have jurisdiction in domestic relations, adoptions, divorces, and the like.
District one would embrace Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Haywood, Jackson, Macon, Swain, and Transylvania counties.
Governor Hodges opposed the plan last week, saying it "may be a long range development" but he doubted if the state is now ready to adopt the program in its entirety.
Each district would have a judge at a salary of \$11,000; clerk, \$5,000; court social service worker, \$4,000; collections clerk, \$3,000; clerical personnel, \$2,500; detention superintendent, \$5,000; professional detention staff members, \$4,000 each; and non-professional detention staff members, \$2,500.

New maps and phonograph records given Iotla School last week brought to \$3,000 the total spent in the last three years by the school's Parent-Teacher Association.
Cost of the new equipment was \$305.
The P.-T. A. has been working toward getting the school accredited. Largest "must" toward accreditation which remains to be done is acquiring a central library. Presently, the principal's office serves in this capacity.
In the last three years, the Iotla P.-T. A. has bought a record player, records, maps, book cases, curtains for the auditorium, outside floodlights, a vacuum cleaner, a buffer, and vitamin capsules for all the children.
Money for the improvements came from P.-T. A. projects, such as the before-Easter supper, Halloween party, box suppers, and an amateur theatrical production, "The Man in the Green Shirt".
