Sloan Speaks To Rotarians On Europe Trip

W. N. Sloan, who recently returned to Franklin from a trip to Europe, last week told the Franklin Rotary Club about his experiences and observations.

Mr. Sloan visited his son, Col. George B. Sloan, and family in Vienna, and while away attended the sessions of the Rotary International convention at Lake Lucerne, Switzerland. At Lake Lucerne, he pointed out, he stayed at a hotel some 1,500 feet above the lake and town, reached by an inclined railway.

He crossed the Atlantic by plane, leaving New York about 10 o'clock one afternoon and having breakfast the next morning at a place in northern Scotland. The flight across the ocean was made at an altitude of about 22,000 feet.

In flying over Europe, and later on motor trips, he was impressed by the pattern of the farms. Each inch of ground is used, he said, either as forest or for growing crops.

He told how the palaces of the former emperors of Austria-Hungary are used for the public; the winter palace is an art museum, the grounds of the summer palace are a huge park.

The famed Vienna Woods, a forested area near Vienna, is city-owned, and used both for the growing of timber and as a park. The Viennese flock there on week ends and holidays, he said, many on bicycles, some on foot. He estimated that three times as many in Europe travel by bicycle as by automobile.

His greatest disappointment on the trip, he said, was the Idlewild Airport in New York. He had expected something beautiful and elaborate, but found that the only buildings completed are temporary wooden structures.

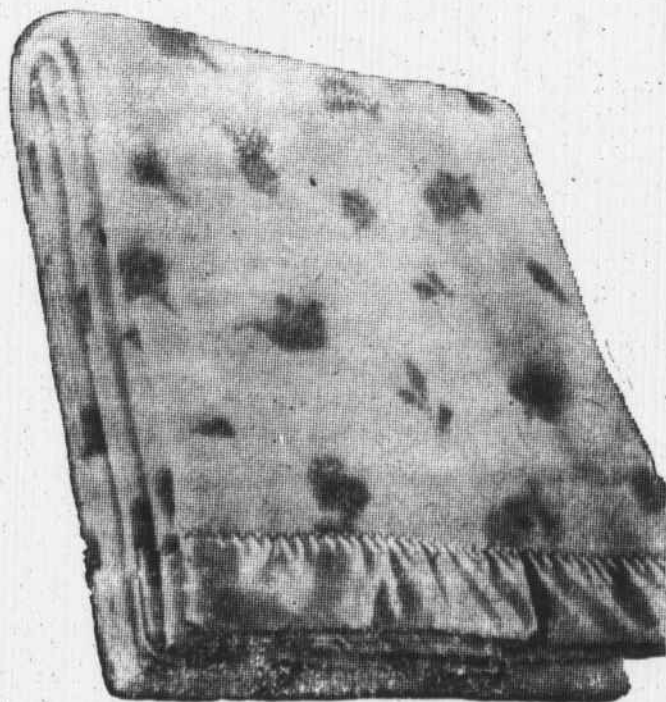
