## Local Sailor Is Spending A Frosty Summer Aboard Ship Above Arctic Circle

Victor N. Teague, machinist's mate third class, is spending a frosty summer above the Arctic Circle aboard the dock landing ship USS Rushmore on the annual re-supply of the stations of the Distant Early Warning (DEW-line) radar network.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow Teague, of Franklin, Route 2.

A Fleet Home Town News Center announcement said some 96 ships are taking part in the operation, 50, in the Atlantic and 46 in the Pacific. This year's trip is considered to be doubly dangerous over previous ones with the ships facing the heaviest concentration of ice in history.

The ships will carry 500,000 tons of supplies to the men along North America's "back fence".

Vic's ship is scheduled to return to Norfolk, Va., on Oct. 10, the announcement said.

Since the commissioning of the Navy's Hurricane Hunters in 1946, the squadron has flown into 70 hurricanes involving winds of over 75 miles per hour.



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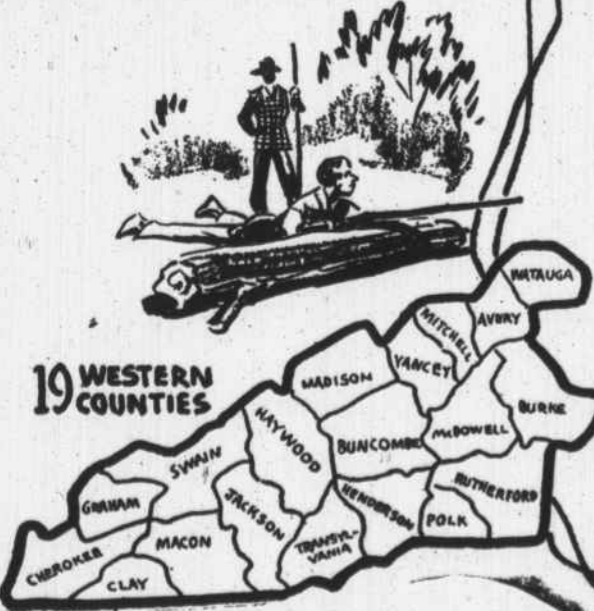
