 1 cup pineapple juice
 2 eggs, well beaten
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin
 1/4 cup water
 1 cup whipping cream
 1 cup grated sharp cheese
 Soften one tablespoon plain gelatin with 1/4 cup cold water. Mix sugar, flour, salt and juice. Stir in beaten eggs and cook in heavy saucepan until thickened. Stir in softened gelatin and mix well. Chill until partially thickened. Fold in 1 cup cream, which has been whipped. Pile lightly on gelatin layer. Sprinkle shredded cheese over top. Chill. Serve on lettuce. Crackers are good accompaniment.
