

## Judd E. Potts, Cabinet Maker, Dies In Franklin

Judd E. Potts, a casket and cabinet maker for 50 years here, died Sunday at 6:30 a. m. at his home in Franklin. Eighty-seven years old, he had been in declining health for some time.

Funeral services for Mr. Potts, a native of this county, were conducted Monday afternoon at Potts Funeral Home with the Rev. S. B. Moss and the Rev. Carl Sorrells officiating. Burial was in Woodlawn Cemetery.

Born in the Cowee Community, he was the son of the late Thomas and Mrs. Sally Tippet Potts. He and his wife, the former Miss Isabelle Raby, celebrated their 64th wedding anniversary last December. Mr. Potts was a member of the Cowee Baptist Church.

Surviving are his widow, a son, Paul Potts, of Franklin, three grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

Serving as pallbearers were Algie Luther, and Claude Raby and Floyd Lawrence, and Harry Potts, all nephews.

## Four-Session Study Course Starts Sunday

Macon Native Left Here In 1922; Set Services Friday

David Lawrence Conley, a Macon County native who left here in 1922, died Sunday at the home of a step-daughter, Mrs. Betty Dennis Leigh, in Baltimore, Md.

He was 60 years old and has been ill for five months. Son of Mrs. Ada Bradley Conley, of Otto, and the late Ed Conley, he spent his early life at Otto and was educated in the public schools here. In 1922 he went to work for Pennsylvania Power and Light Company. In 1926 he went with the Atlantic City Electric Company in Wildwood, N. J., and was district supervisor of the company.

Funeral services for Mr. Conley are scheduled tomorrow (Friday) at 3 p. m. at the Asbury Methodist Church and burial will be in the church cemetery. The Rev. S. P. Bell and the Rev. Glenn Anderson will officiate.

Mr. Conley was married in 1938 to Miss Myrtle Ball, of Spencer, W. Va., who survives, was a member of the Wildwood Methodist Church, a Kiwanian, a Mason, and a Shriner.

In addition to his wife, mother, and step-daughter, he is survived by two brothers, John Conley, of Otto and Dennis Conley, of New Jersey; two sisters, Miss Fannie Conley and Mrs. Maude Shope, both of Otto; and four step-grandchildren.
