FAULTY EQUIPMENT
RALEIGH—Faulty mechanical equipment was responsible for 67 of North Carolina's fatal auto check-ups last year. A Motor Vehicles Department investigation into the 1957 traffic death toll revealed defective brakes and tires as the principal defect leading to the death crashes. Altogether there were 932 such accidents, which killed 1,063 persons and injured 19,602 others by the year's end.

BUTTERMILK ROLLS
Sift before measuring four cups bread flour. Scald two cups buttermilk. Cool until lukewarm. Dissolve one yeast cake in 1/2 cup of luke warm buttermilk. Add this to the remaining buttermilk with 1/4 teaspoon soda, two teaspoons salt, 1/4 cup sugar, two tablespoons melted butter. Beat this mixture well; then stir the flour in gradually. Place the dough in a greased bowl. Spread the top lightly with melted butter. Cover the dough, put it in a warm place, permit it to rise until it is almost tripled in bulk. Knead it lightly for one minute. Roll out dough to thickness of 1/2 inch and cut with biscuit cutter. Place on greased sheet. Permit rolls to rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in hot oven (425°) for about 15 minutes.

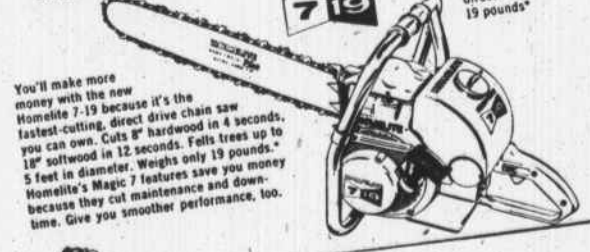
