Mrs. Hallie Porter Bass, a native of Franklin, died in an Asheville hospital last Thursday morning. She was 79.

She was a half-sister of J. D. (De) Porter, and a first cousin of T. W. Porter, both of Franklin. The only other survivors are a nephew, N. W. C. Gennett, and a brother-in-law, Nathaniel Gennett, both of Asheville. Mrs. Bass's two sons by her first marriage, to Reed Crawford, are dead.

The widow of John F. Bass, she had lived in Asheville for many years, having moved there from Waynesville. Earlier, she had made her home in Atlanta. Born and reared in Franklin, she spent much of her early married life here.

The daughter of Robert L. (Bob) Porter and Mrs. Mary Frances Cunningham Porter, she was born Dec. 3, 1878. She was graduated from Salem Academy and Salem College, in Winston-Salem, and later taught Latin in the academy for a number of years. Day by day the death tally went: Sunday 202, Monday 119, Tuesday 110, Wednesday 93, Thursday 125, Friday 163, and Saturday 251.
