## ON SEPTEMBER 30 — 3-County Highway Meeting Scheduled

Raleigh—Representatives of the State Highway Commission have announced a meeting on secondary road matters for the citizens of Jackson, Swain, and Macon counties to be held in the Jackson County Courthouse in Sylva the night of September 30. The session, scheduled for 8 o'clock, will be attended by several members of the seven-man State Highway Commission, along with Highway Director W. F. Babcock and Secondary Roads Officer Harold Makepeace.

This area-wide meeting on secondary road matters is one of several being scheduled in other areas of the state for the purpose of explaining in detail the secondary road program of the highway commission, as well as answering individual questions on particular county road problems. Members of the highway commission will bring to the meeting the county plans of Jackson, Swain, and Macon for secondary road improvements and paving for the current biennium. In addition, the point count for each secondary road in the three-county area with a traffic count of more than fifty vehicles per day will be available for examination.

Highway Commission Chairman J. Melville Broughton said he hopes there will be a good turnout of citizens from the three-county area to discuss secondary road matters.

"We are looking forward to the Sylva meeting on September 30," Mr. Broughton said, "and we feel it will be an excellent opportunity for residents of these counties to present their particular road

problems to the highway commission and its staff."
