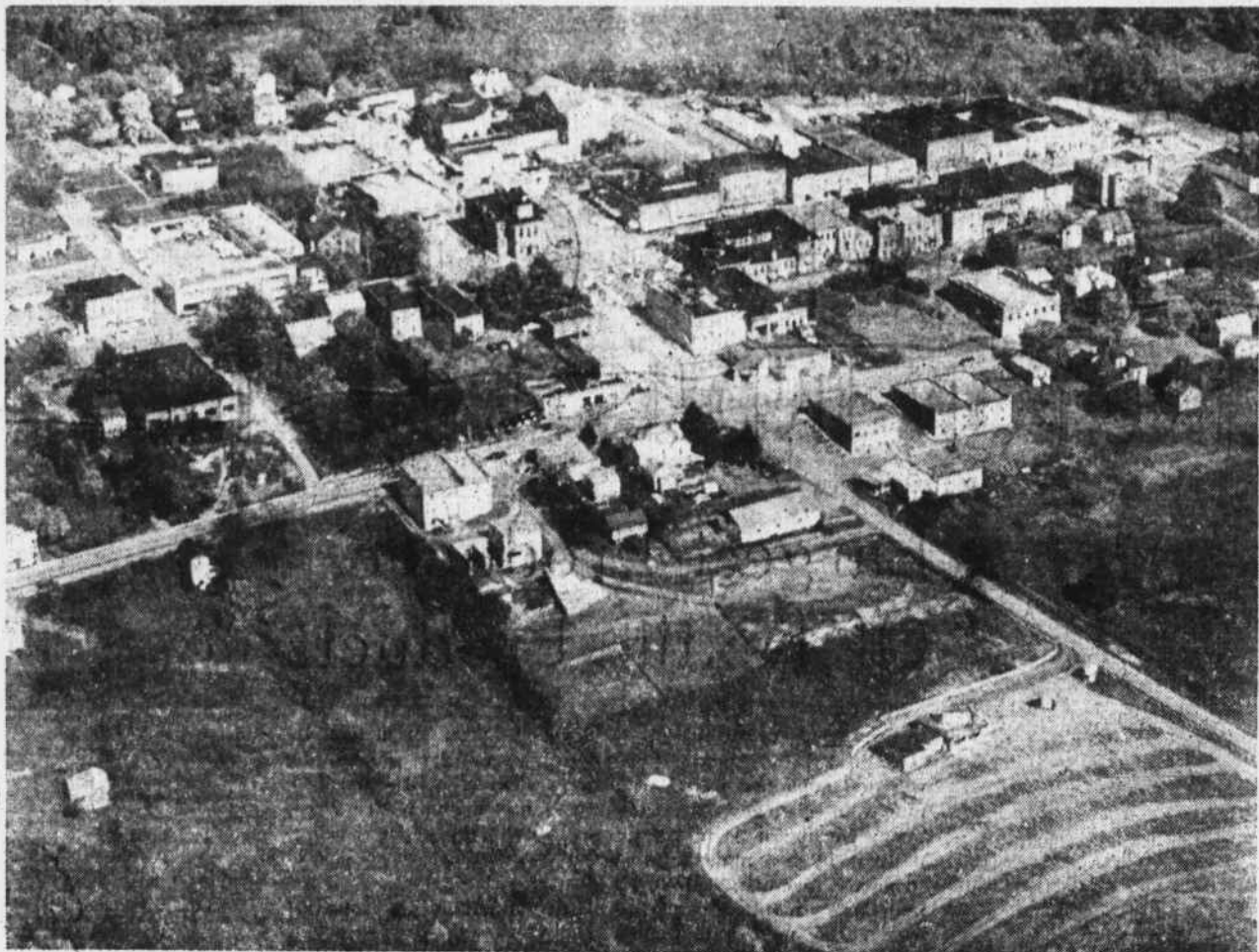

County and Rabun County (Ga.) decided to pursue federal funds for flood control on the Little Tennessee as separate organizations... the checker board came out on Main Street as the first sign of Spring and dogwood blossoms began dotting the mountainsides... Sterling Peek found a 101-carat ruby in Cewee Valley... Western Carolina Telephone Company announced plans for building a \$60,000 building in Franklin to house dial equipment and business offices... volunteers, including firemen, washed down the streets... THE FRANKLIN PRESS changed from a seven-column page to eight columns to provide more room for news in a growing Macon County... Mrs. Marie Barnard, of the local V.P.W. Auxiliary, received a special award from the national organization for her work on the local post and auxiliary community service record book... Franklin won another round in keeping bus service here when Queen City Trailways decided to rescind a cancellation order and keep the morning bus to Asheville... "The Donkey Man" made a sweep through the county, penetrating from the south and leaving to the west... JUNE: Mrs. C. T. Bryson was elected president of the Macon County Home Demonstration County Council... Assistant County Agent Clark Walker resigned to take over operation of his father's farm in Old Fort... Democrats renominated all incumbents in the May 31 primary... Little League and Babe Ruth play started... Bobby Swan was awarded Scouting's highest rank, Eagle... two visitors boating on Nantahala Lake drowned when

the boat struck a log and capsized. Macon's rescue squadron was instrumental in recovering the bodies of the victims... A. & T. T. agents nabbed a big still operation in the Coweta section, including two men, 308 gallons of whiskey, a sedan, and a Jeep truck... Camp Highlander opened for its first season... H. H. Gnuse, Jr., vice-president of Nantahala Power and Light Company, was promoted to the Pittsburgh power engineering division of ALCOA... county tax rate was upped a dime, to \$1.60 per hundred... Charlie Ray "Bo" Norton, one-time Franklin High athlete, was killed near Hot Springs in an automobile accident... paving got under way on US 23-441 between Franklin and the state line, with the project described as one of the largest of its kind ever undertaken in the area... Bryan Anders, of Barnardsville, joined the county agent's staff, succeeding Clark Walker... Franklin Chamber of Commerce unveiled its new "Welcome to Franklin" promotional project, on that was copied by many other towns in the area in later months... Verlon Swafford was installed as president of the Franklin Lions Club... J. W. (Red) Smith, former Duke University football star and personnel supervisor for the Franklin Hosiery Plant, was promoted to the Mooreville Mills, a member plant of Burlington Industries, and was succeeded here by Earl Adams, who had been with the company's Wadesboro plant... JULY: James M. (Jim) Raby defeated incumbent Rep. G. L. Huk in a run-off Democratic primary by a vote of 932 to 144... Bill Potts, a local F.F.A. member, was elected state F.F.A. treasurer... Don Austin, of High Point, a former member of Billy Graham's evangelistic team, preached at the annual interdenominational evangelistic series here... Wayah View Motel in East Franklin was sold by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Carpenter to Mr. and Mrs. Fred D. Cobe... Prelo J. Dryman was named to the Franklin Board of Aldermen to serve out the unexpired term of H. H. Gnuse, Jr. Franklin Post Office became a first class office... Franklin was host to the western division Little League play-offs... a "mis-

understanding among some" of the employees at Franklin Hosiery Plant caused a work stoppage for several shifts... Claude H. Bolton was elevated to vice-president and treasurer and W. W. Sloan to secretary and director of the Nantahala Power and Light Company... Macon County's V.F.W. Auxiliary won the top award in the state for community service... Congressman George A. Shuford resigned because of his health and David M. Hall, of Sylva, was named to succeed him by area Democrats as representative of the 12th Congressional District... Forest City knocked Franklin's Little League All-Stars out of the regional championship in Forest City by a score of 6 to 0... AUGUST: \$615,450.21 budget was adopted by the Macon Board of County Commissioners... the Rev. Clyde Rhinehart was elected moderator of the Macon Baptist association at the organization's 58th annual session... Cowee Ruby Mines, through the chamber of commerce and Jim Brinkman, local gem cutter, met the rest of the "rockhounding" world at the eighth annual international Gem and Mineral Show of the Eastern Federation of Mineral Societies in Asheville... Macon County Fair opened on the grounds at Franklin High for the biggest and best year yet... the C.A.A. "push button" radio unit on Wine Springs Blvd went into operation... Robert C. (Bob) Smith was elected president of the Little League... the Jay birds were declared winner of the Little League season... Macon's role in Civil Defense in the event of an enemy attack was pinpointed as a "support county" charged with caring for 25,000 evacuees from Tennessee... SEPTEMBER: Gary McKeivey was elevated to Eagle rank, Scouting's highest... Franklin High opened its '58 football season by losing to Andrews 12 to 7... "Pilots Ruby Rendezvous", a promotion attracting 25 airplanes and some 75 people from Florida, was held in Franklin... the Rev. Donn K. Langfitt was elected president of the Macon County Ministerial Association... through the efforts of the Franklin Lions Club, city mail delivery was assured... Franklin churches staged a religious canvass...

Franklin gem cutter Jim Brinkman was seriously injured in an auto accident near Hot Springs, Ark... local citizens organized for a United Fund campaign here, with the Rev. Donn K. Langfitt as chairman... OCTOBER: Higdonville Home Demonstration Club won "The Gavel", the county's highest achievement award, and Mrs. Julian Maddox, of Cartoogechaye, was honored as "Club Woman of the Year"... Far Western North Carolina and North Carolina got back together again, with the opening of the Sylva-Balsam highway... Macon County saluted its oldesters at the annual "Fellowship Hour"... Cartoogechaye and Union schools were accredited... Franklin High's mimeographed newspaper, The Mountain Echo, won first place at the annual High School Editor's Roundtable at Western Carolina College... Max Parrish was reelected chairman of the county A.S.C. committee... a seven-county leadership training school for home demonstration clubs was held in Franklin... a Franklin native, William B. McGuire, was elevated to the presidency of Duke Power Company... NOVEMBER: Democrats made a clean sweep of the general election... Patton community won the county's top prize in the rural development contest... Fred Deal, young Holly Springs farmer, was honored by the Franklin Junior Chamber of Commerce as "Macon County's Young Farmer of the Year"... R. E. (Tony) Welch resigned as county veteran's service officer to take a Civil Service job in Macon, Ga... Macon entries at the W.N.C. Fat Tock Show won 21 blue ribbons and three reds, two first places

No blues from this Southland—Florida gives us oranges instead. And grapefruit too, of course, bright and yellow like the sunshine they grow in. Maybe you were a little bit list to receive a basketful of beautiful citrus fruits this holiday season. If so, you're probably wondering how to utilize the fruit besides juicing it. You can make preserves and relishes, too, that can be put away for the future enjoyment of your family and guests. Local dealers will be handling more Florida citrus than ever this winter so don't feel badly if you didn't get a gift basket. The best oranges and grapefruit are in your neighborhood, just filled with health-giving vitamin C. During the winter months be especially sure to get enough of this infection resisting vitamin. Try spiced orange wedges with your next pork roast. They make a perfect flavor accompaniment:

- Spiced Orange Wedges: 4 Florida oranges, 2 cups sugar, 1 1/4 cups water, 1/2 cup vinegar, 12 whole cloves, 3 pieces stick cinnamon. Orange Cranberry Relish: 2 Florida oranges, quartered and seeded, 4 cups fresh cranberries, 2 cups sugar.

Put whole oranges in saucepan; add 1 quart water. Bring to a boil; boil 20 minutes. Drain and cut into eighths. Combine sugar, 1 1/4 cups water, vinegar, cloves and cinnamon; stir over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Bring to a boil; add pieces of orange and simmer about 30 minutes. Cool; cover and store in refrigerator. Serve as a relish. NOTE: Orange wedges may be spooned into sterilized jars and sealed.

Cut into narrow strips. 6 cups apples, sliced, 2 tablespoons flour, 3/4 cup sugar, 1/2 tablespoon cinnamon, 3 tablespoons butter. Mix flour, sugar, cinnamon and butter.
